# \* MINIMEMORY QUESTION \*

I have encountered an unusual problem using the Minimemory. The problem involves the save memory to cassette function, as described on p. 69 and 70 of the Minimemory manual. In Easybug, I have used the command "SA000" to save a block of CPU expansion memory to cassette. When I perform the recording check, all seems well. However, as soon as I try to load this information back into the A000 location in memory, I receive error "07". The cassette seems to put out only the first few bytes of the block, and the error occurs immediately. It seems like the loader won't allow the cassette to load data to anyplace but the 7000-7FFF block of the Minimemory. Does anyone have a solution to this, so I can load cassette data directly to expansion memory with Easybug?

Also, I found out by trial and error that 8K is the maximum block size Easybug will allow to be saved.

Also available are PP FONTS (a few of the 50 are shown on these two pages); PP TITLES (which are works of art unto themselves); PP UTILITIES (which allow some extraordinary manipulations of the graphics for all kinds of on-screen pasteups & designs.
