

There was a discussion about the new TI community communication service put into operation by Tom Wills. This is a replacement for the original text only List Server that served all TIers so well. The new service is a text/graphic web site provided by eGroups.com and is dedicated to the users of the TI-99/4A and the Myarc, Geneve 9640. I explained that, as far as I know, it was still scheduled for the first weekend in June, at the National Guard armory in Lorain, Ohio. I said there have been several organizational meeting that I was unable to attend, but I conveyed the Tier's requirements for a minimum of 1000 square feet of floor space. I talked about how easy it is to make a mess of the clear plastic window on a scanner with lotion filled tissues. The January minutes were read and Lin Shaw gave the Treasurer's report. Once again Les Kee had to report that there was no activity in the disk library last month. John Parken reported that we have 16 members and March is the important membership renewal month. John also brought in the updated e-mail address listing of Chips members. Some addresses were changed and John said he would have another updated list for us next month.

Harry Hoffman and I both recommended the Chips members join the On Line TI-99/4A User Group (OLUG). The text and graphic capabilities make this service, moderated by Tom Wills, a must for TIers around the world. A short discussion was made on the future of paper newsletters. It was agreed that the electronic newsletter would eventually replace the paper publication. This is why the E-group, On Line User Group will become so important for maintaining communication throughout the TI community.

At this point, it was suggested that we ask Rich Polivka if he would be interested in scanning our complete Cleveland Area TI-99/4A User Groups newsletter library onto CDs. I said I would contact Rich about this request. This would be a wonderful way to preserve the history of the Cleveland Area TI-99/4A user groups.

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Beginners SIG Leader Took His Lead From TI

Remember the old Texas instruments computers? GCPCUG member Matthew Andel does. One of them, the old TI-99/4A home computer,

an offspring of the early 1980s, got him going on PCs – and going — and going.

Today, he's a proud owner of a 500 MHz Pentium III Gateway, with all the bells and whistles. He's also the leader of the Beginners West SIG, which meets on the second Monday of every month, at 6:30 PM, at The Reserves Network, 22021 Brookpark Road, Fairview Park. But he credits his old TI with inspiring him to learn about PCs and to share that knowledge with others.

We tell his personal PC journey here, in hopes it will spur all "beginners"—whether troubleshooting a first PC or even Number Five—to keep on tinkering.

Andel's PC life started out simply enough. "I took a computer class in high school," he recalls. "Then I asked my parents for a computer. The TI is what they bought me."

His main interest at the time was playing computer games, and sharing them with buddies. "The technology was so simple then that we just saved the games to a cassette, and used a television for the monitor," he says.

Soon, Andel's interest grew deeper, so he joined one of the four TI user groups that had formed in Northern Ohio and later became its president. He liked the connections this brought him, and the experience there paved the way for his SIG leadership many years later. "We met monthly, had demos, put out a newsletter, shared ideas, and in many ways, functioned like a SIG," he says.

But once 386 PCs debuted in the early 1990s, it was good-bye TI. Andel's new 386 only ran DOS, but it operated so much faster than the TI, weighed so much less, and could do so much more, that it rapidly reeled him in. After that, Andel's PC life picked up speed. He upgraded to Windows 3.0, started running Win 3.0 games, ventured into word processing, and visited bulletin boards on the old Cleveland FreeNet. In 19934, when he saw a neighbor's 90 MHz Pentium PC with Windows 3.11, he bought one too.

By 1997, he once again started feeling the need to share—and get help with—his PC adventures—this time, from people running Windows. In the newspaper, he noticed a meeting announcement for a GCPCUG SIG headed by Jim Evans and Bob Coppedge.

The rest is history: "I went to that meeting, loved it, and signed up right on the spot." Soon, he upgraded to Windows 95, and later to Windows 98. He attended general meetings and SIGs. He read books, exchanged ideas with friends, followed postings on the Internet, called tech support, plowed through manuals, and used trial-and error all along the way.

By mid-1998, Andel felt he had acquired enough confidence with PCs to volunteer to take over the West Side Beginners SIG with Ken Koglin. The two ran it jointly for a while, and later Andel started leading it solo. "I like showing people things about the computer," he says of the sessions, "and I learn things from them, too."

Where's all his PC-drive coming from? It's not from his advanced education, he

says, noting he didn't take computer courses while earning his BS degree. Nor did it come from employment pressure (he is currently employed in another field). "No," he says, "I stick with PCs because I want to. The machines just interest me."

Any parting tips for beginners? "Sure," he says. "Expect problems. For instance, at one point, Windows kept crashing on me, so I had to reformat the hard drive. I didn't know how, but I learned what to do from people at GCPCUG. You can do the same.

"Also: When you're purchasing a new PC, ask what kind of support the manufacturer offers. Does it have an 800 number to call on a 24/7 basis? Are there any charges? Then, when you need help, be sure to call!

"Finally, remember that it really does get better—eventually."

THE JIM PETERSON ACHIEVEMENT AWARDS

The Jim Peterson Achievement Awards, conceived by Jim Krych to honor the memory of Jim Peterson, are sponsored by the TI-Chips.

Following is the preamble for the Jim Peterson Awards as penned by Jim Krych in January 1996.

"The late Jim Peterson made an invaluable contribution to the Texas Instruments 99/4A home computer community. His selfless and tireless work in many areas of TI-99/4A related material made him recognized throughout the world-wide network of TI-99/4A users.

As such, in an effort to further the spirit that his work had started, the following award system is enacted: The Jim Peterson Achievement Award. This will recognize TI-99/4A users and user groups for their outstanding achievements. The awards will be broken down into four areas. They are as follows: TI-99/4A Software, TI-99/4A Hardware, TI-99/4A Community and Geneve 9640 achievement."

Jim Krych contacted Jim Peterson's family to gain permission to make these awards in his honor. The Jim Peterson family granted their permission, and the TI-Chips voted unanimously in February 1996 to sponsor this great honor. Although Jim Peterson, a prolific programmer, was not a member of the TI-Chips, Jim's contributions and dedication touched all TI-99/4A users and user groups.

It must be noted that the Jim Peterson Achievement Award nominating and voting committees are comprised of the entire TI-99/4A community. The TI-99/4A community nominates the award candidates and the same community casts the deciding votes for the candidates of their choice. The only part the TI-Chips has in this endeavor is to gather nominations, post the ballot, record votes and present the awards. This is truly an interactive, international process to recognize the achievements and contributions of deserving individuals and user groups by their peers. In this way, we are ensuring that the spirit of Jim Peterson's dedication to community service is continued through the presentation of these awards in his name.

The first winners of the Jim Peterson Achievement Awards, selected through an international call for votes from the TI-99/4A community, and presented at TIMUG'96 in Brook Park, Ohio, were:

TI-99/4A Software: Tony and Will McGovern (Funnelweb)

TI-99/4A Hardware: Bud Mills (Horizon RamDisk)

TI-99/4A Community: Dr. Charles Good (MUG Conferences at Lima, Ohio) Geneve 9640: Both Tim Tesch and Beery Miller (First and only voting tie award presented.)

Although Jim Krych is no longer with the TI-Chips, the TI-Chips will continue to sponsor the Jim Peterson Achievement Awards as long as there are TIers in the world who deserve recognition for their contributions and efforts on behalf of the TI-99/4A community. This is the least we can do to honor the memory of a great programmer, TIer and person, Jim Peterson.
