SINGLE-SIDED, DOUBLE-SIDED

A letter in the December 1985 issue of CHANGING TIMES came from Gloria Friedman of DAMOMICS (Development and Modification of Mini-Computer Software) in Elmira, N.Y. caught my eye and I'd like to pass the savings on to you. She said, in part that, "Single-sided disk drives ... read the side of the diskette that most people call the bottom, which is the side without the label on it. Most people carefully place their diskettes on the table, label side up. That is wrong. Ideally they should be stored vertically.

If you purchase single-sided diskettes and format them for double-sided use, you can expect to be just as reliable as double-sided diskettes. Users of single-sided drives can punch their disks for double-sided use, but they should be cautioned to punch the disk prior to using either side since there is a risk of bending the diskette during the process."

Watch the GRAY DRUG ads. They have been selling a box of 10 Certron 5.25" single-sided, double density diskettes for \$8.88 + tax. And, they come in a plastic storage box!. I have seen the regular price listed at \$9.99 and \$12.99.

Also, trying to set up a program to read and write files, was a total impossibility because the user's manual explained very little, and was of no help at all. I know that any machine requires some getting used to, but even the people who use that machine heavily, complain about those things and many other user "unfriendly" aspects of the machine. The documentation that came with the word processor and printer, doesn't even mention how to access the different type styles or send control codes when using the word processor. My point is that it really makes me appreciate my T.I. even more for it's ease of use and much better user oriented documentation. (Do I sound a little bit biased?)

CHICAGO TI FAIRE

The Chicago TI Faire was held on Nov.2, 1985 at Triton College near Chicago. Tom and Judy Thalner, Ken Gladyszewski, and Martin Smolley attended from this area. Over 1700 TI-99/4A owners from all over the country were in attendance. Approximately thirty vendors of hardware and software, with both new and old products, were also there.

Key speakers were Craig Miller, from Miller's Graphics in California; Lou Phillips, from Myarc Inc. in Basking Ridge, New Jersey; and John Clulow, from New Horizons in Toledo.

Craig Miller began the day with a demonstration and explanation of the "Gram Cracker" which will be released in mid-December. The "Gram Cracker" is a plug-in "Super Cartridge" with 56K of battery-backed RAM and GRAM memory. This amazing piece of hardware will be valuable to everyone since it can be used with just the basic console and a recorder or the fully equipped system. It opens up the full power of the 99/4A, making it "your own personal computer".

Lou Phillips spoke in the early afternoon to an overflow crowd. He began by highlighting the newer products that Myarc has already developed for the TI and ended with a discussion of the new TI-compatible computer that will be released during the first quarter of 1986. He showed the group the prototype motherboard and keyboard which he stated will eventually be joined to form the new computer. No name has yet been selected but there has been some thought to calling it the "NOAH". It will have 256K of RAM, using TI's 9995 microprocessor and 9938 video display chips. This machine will be nearly 100% TI compatible and have amazing execution speed. Other features that have been mentioned are: 40-80 column, RGB-composite color, built-in RS232 ports, ability to use various locaters, ie. joystick, mouse, etc., compatability with most existing systems, viz. CorComp, Myarc, and TI.

The day's presentations were wrapped up by John Clulow from New Horizons in Toledo who demonstrated a RAM-disk that he has developed.

The theme for this years Faire--the third such event-- was "Goin' Stronger Than Ever", although T-shirts were seen which said "I Adopted an Orphan." The Faire was very well attended with people 3 or 4 deep at most tables and standing room only for the featured presentations.

The New Horizons UG of Toledo presented its RAM Disk which has evolved from a hand wired prototype into a polished product using a custom designed printed circuit board.

Myarc gave details about its current efforts. Its major effort is on an enhanced extended basic which utilizes their 128K card and frees up the 16K of console VDP RAM for display purposes. This product is very close to being released. Plans for the new computer were discussed and a non-functioning prototype was shown. It is slated to be available at the end of the first quarter of 1986. From the information presented it appears to be quite a machine.

Craig Miller of Miller Graphics had a working model of his Gram Kracker and was taking orders for delivery in time for Christmas. This device allows any module to be copied to disk or cassette and utilizes 8K static RAM chips to replace the 6K GROM chips used in most TI cartridges. Sockets for 3 extra chips are provided to replace the 3 GROMS in the console which contain the operating system. This opens up our machine to many new sophisticated products. Along these lines work is progressing to release a GPL Assembler and Disassembler in early 1986.

All this for a machine out of production for 2 years--enough to make some take their 99/4A out of the closet. Yes--we're "Goin' Stronger Than Ever."

The TI-Faire in Chicago was great! I was able to attend by hitching a ride with Tom and Judy Thalner of Edu-Comp. It was wonderful to see so much enthusiasm and continuing support both in software and hardware for our machine!

Those in attendance at the November meeting saw the pictures I took as well as a portion of the video tape obtained from the Chicago group by Edu-Comp. Please see my report elsewhere for a comprehensive report on the Faire.

Our Head Librarian, Deanna Sheridan, reported that the first installment of Amnion disks (educational, home/financial, engineering and utility) have been cataloged--this now brings us to 1500 programs. She is now working on 40 game disks and I am transferring the last part--25 music disks. When all of this is finished--hopefully around the beginning of the year, the total should be in excess of 2000!! Great job Deanna!!

P.S. The latest on the poor mans double density disk controller is that it is simpler than expected (no board modifications) due to an EPROM chip which is pin for pin compatible with the ROMS used on the disk controller. However, it requires 80 track 96 TPI drives and is not compatible with true double density operation. More about this as information becomes available.

Using "PRINT USING"
with your printer

One of the more obscure statements available with TI Extended BASIC is one called PRINT USING. Even more obscure is the fact that this statement can be used to format variables and constants that will be dumped to your printer. The Extended BASIC manual, on page 150, shows several examples of how PRINT USING can be used to format data for screen display, but nary a word of how to do the same with open files. It can be done, and is much more powerful than you may realize.

Any discussion of PRINT USING will require an understanding of the IMAGE statement, so if you are not familiar with it, you better brush up on it first. The PRINT USING statement uses IMAGE in one of two ways, either with a string expression, or a line number reference. I prefer the latter, as it allows for more flexibility, but since these different methods are explained in the manual, I will limit this to a few simple examples that are not shown in the manual.

```
100 TCOST=19.55
110 IMAGE ##.##
120 OPEN #1:"PIO"
130 PRINT #1,USING 110:TCOST
```

Running this sample program will effectively show how the PRINT USING statement will work with an open file. Of course, there are many other variations of IMAGE that can be used, so experiment with them and watch how it performs when line 130 dumps it to the printer. Shown below are a few more examples for use with an open file.

```
110 IMAGE "##.##      ##.##"
130 PRINT #1,USING 110:COST1,COST2
```

This IMAGE statement will allow you to print two (or more) variables at a pre-determined spot on the same line. The length of the string expression in the IMAGE statement can be as long as you wish, up to the limit of an Extended BASIC line.

```
110 IMAGE "#####      ##.##"
130 PRINT #1,USING 110:"TOTAL COST",
TCOST
```

This version shows how you can format the printed line for string data as well as numerical data. A string variable could be used in place of the string constant, as below.

```
105 A$="TOTAL COST"
110 IMAGE "#####      ##.##"
130 PRINT #1,USING 110:A$,TCOST
```

It is also possible to place the IMAGE statement inside the PRINT USING statement, as shown below. First, delete line 110.

```
130 PRINT #1,USING "#####":TCOST
or
130 PRINT #1,USING "##### ##.##"
:A$,TCOST
```

A few other points to remember include the fact that IMAGE and PRINT USING can be used to round off calculated variables. A single string expression such as "#####.##" will round off and decimal align numbers as small as number at any designated location. This function could save many hours of algorithm development for accomplishing the same thing. So, in the long run, the PRINT USING statement is one that any programmer should be very familiar with, and use as much as possible.
