

Ken called the meeting to order. After failing to drum up any old or new business, he turned the meeting over to Harry Hoffman for a demo.

The demo gremlims almost struck again. Harry was unable to load his demo disk after several tries. He made a remark about double density and we knew the problem. Unlike Chips, the NorthCoast system still has a TI disk controller which will not support double density. Deanna came to the rescue simply because she had been too lazy to take her mini-CorComp system out of the back of her car for several months. We brought it in, thawed it out, and Harry proceeded with his demo of Bruce Harrison's Wordsearch program.

The disk comes with a variety of ready-made puzzles with various themes. To make your own puzzle, use Funnelweb to make a list of 50 to 70 names, each on a separate line and save to disk with the appropriate name. Since this program is written in assembly the puzzle is created almost instantly. If you have a nine-pin printer, use Words9 and if you have a 24-pin or bubblejet, use Words24 to print the puzzles. This is freeware and I believe Harry gave Bruce a copy to make sure it gets in the library.

Harry also demo'd Castle - a graphical maze game with many levels of rooms and difficulties.

Les Kee will have the April Demo. and I believe Jim Harris will be back from Florida in time for the May demo. Don't forget that the week AFTER our May meeting is the Lima conference.

I have the June demo and hope I can pick up something interesting at Lima.

Bruce Harriedn's - Word Search

This program is terrific! Thanks. Bruce, for such a fascinating and fast program. I demoed this program last month and there was a lot of interest, as many asked the librarian for the disk.

I wanted to see if it was possible to put in a clue word or phrase, such as the ones in the newspapers. So, instead of printing the puzzle out to the printer, it was printed to disk. Also printing to disk so the puzzle could be solved and show where there were letters left over. Then the disk file was loaded to FunnelWeb and edited. In the program editor (hollow cursor!), blanking out the left over letters shows how large the secret word or phrase has to be.

Well, I used the membership lists of both clubs and came up with 94 words for NorthCoast and 63 for TI-Chips! Having solved Chips puzzle first, that was the place to start. Boy, did I have a lot of blank space in the WordSearch!! To tell the truth, it was too big to write a phrase... it was more like a book. As long as it was editable, that is what was done. Adding words in all directions was a lot of fun and brought the blanks down to a manageable size. Now, the puzzle came to 126 words and 27 blanks. A nice size for a little sentence.


Another problem was the lockup when trying to use the Words9 to sort and layout the word list. Sort was fine and putting the list in FWB, it was necessary to type in the words by hand. It came to 6 columns, which still left enough space to print the puzzle on a single page. (See next page.) It is granted that not all the words are computer words, but that is my fault.

One thing that should be noted when doing this puzzle in this fashion! Try to circle the BIG words first or you will not find the 3 or 4 letter words that seem to be buried in another larger word. Believe me when I say that some of the little words typed in <u>are</u> in their own space.

I forgot to mention that when printing to disk I did not remove the built in printer commands that Bruce's program inserts. I have no idea if it will print out right without these symbols! This demo has taken up much time and has been so much fun that it will continue to be time consuming! There is every intention of making up more of these special puzzles for family and friends.

If you have to cut out words to get the puzzle to print, that is fine... you can always edit some of them back in with the program editor or add new words. It is a lot of fun. In getting 94 words in the NorthCoast puzzle, it took quite a few times before they fell into place. Next month I will finish North Coast's puzzle and put it in the newsletter.

Well folks, we just finished Fest West. It's been a good year for the SCSI DSR. At last year's Fest West, I had just released version 1.0-2 of the DSR. While at the time, it was a major accomplishment for it to be as good as it was, it was still lacking a few routines and was hiding a few unknown bugs.

I kept working on the DSR releasing a new minor version every month or so until version 1.0-7 came out in June of 1996. This was the most stable, most bug free, most feature rich DSR for the SCSI card the world had ever seen.

The drive for excellence didn't end here. With the help of Rich Gilbertson who would use and abuse the SCSI DSR in ways I never thought humanly possible, we identified a couple of obscure bugs that had never turned up in mormal everyday use.

As Rich found them, I'd crush them. Sometimes working into the wee hours of the night. At times I hated Rich because Fest West was drawing near and I wanted to release a new DSR. But I knew what I had to do. I kept hammering away. Sometimes, the code grew too big to fit into the 4K banks of DSR space forcing me to rewrite code to make it more efficient. What we ended up with is version 1.1 of the DSR for the SCSI card.

Again, I can say this is the most bug free. most robust DSR for the SCSI card the world has ever seen! Unfortunately, one major criticism of the SCSI card still remains. The Disk Manager can use some improvements. I had been spending so much of my time working on the DSR, I didn't do much with the disk manager. I figured it was easier to distribute a new disk manager (via internet, bulletin boards, floppies) than it was to distribute new EPROMS with an updated DSR.

In the upcoming couple of months, I hope to change this. I will work on making the disk manager more easy to use. Who knows, I may even add an option to catalog the disk!


