

TEXAS INSTRUMENTS COMES POARING BACK

The above heading was the title of an article in the February 14, 1983 issue of "Business Week" magazine. It covered the company in general but concentrated its emphasis on computer sales, and specifically on the 99/4A. The article was very positive in its editorial approach and described some of the things TI is doing to regain leadership in the computer industry.

It stated that sales of the 99/46 has captured 35 percent of the market for microcomputers selling for less * than \$1688, finishing 1982 with 788,688 99/48's in use. It said that II's consumer group is "awash in orders for the home computer, which is selling at a red-hot 30.600 units a week".

Another thing mentioned was the recent introduction of the 99/2 in competition with the Timex (Sinclair) com- + puter. It mentioned that the new II computer has more features than the Timex but still lists for \$99.95.

FEBRUARY 6. 1983

HUG'S GETTING IT'S OWN COMPUTER

THE FOLLOWING EQUIPMENT HAS BEEN DONATED TO HUG: DISK CONTROLLER(ON LOAN)-BILL DEVALLE. CASSETTE CABLE-BILL HUNT. AND SPEECH SYNTHESIZER-CHARLES EHNINGER. LEVI NORMAN REPORTED THAT HE CAN PURCHASE FROM THE TI EMPLOYEE STORE A CONSOLE (TI-99/4A) DISK DRIVE AND MONITOR AND MONITOR CABLE FOR \$857.85. IT WAS DISCUSSED ABOUT PURCHASING A TV SET VERSUS A 10" MONITOR FOR ABOUT \$25 LESS. ONE WOULD SACRIFICE RESOLUTION WITH A TV SET. A 10" MONITOR WOULD BE DIFFICULT FOR ALL TO SEE. BILL DEVALLE COULD POSSIBLY HOOK UP TO TV SETS OR MONITORS FROM THE MODULATOR.

A \$10 ONE-TIME ASSESSMENT WILL BE MADE TO EACH MEMBER TO HELP PAY FOR THE COST OF THE CLUB'S COMPUTER EQUIPMENT. UPON PAYMENT. THE MEMBER WILL RECEIVE A \$10 CREDIT TOWARDS THE PURCHASE OF SOFTWARE PROGRAMS FROM THE LIBRARY. EACH MEMBER WILL BE RESPONSIBLE FOR SUPPLYING HIS OR HER OWN CASSETTE TAPE OR DISK TO RECORD THE PROGRAMS ON.

THE MEMBERS SHALL TELL MR. BUCY HOW ME WITHEY ENJOY THEIR TI-99/4A AND WOULD LIKE TO SPEND MORE MONEY ON ENTERTAINMENT AND EDUCATIONAL MODULES. HOWEVER. THE MODULES ARE NOT COMING AVAILABLE TO THE ENSUMER QUICK ENOUGH LIKE TI'S COMPETITOR - ATARI WITH ALL THEIR GAME CAREFIDGES. THEY SHOULD ASK TI TO REVERSE THEIR POLICY AND ALLOW PRODUCTION OF THIRD PARTY COMMAND MODULES BUT ONLY AFTER THE MODULE GETS A STAMP OF APPROVALEROM TI AND THE THIRD PARTY COMMAND MODULE PRODUCER AGREES IN PAY TI A SMALL FEE OR ROYALTY ON THE SALES.

DEMO OF NEW SOFTWARE

THE TI-99/4A GETS A FACELIFT

THE TI-99/4A IS GETTING A FACELIFT - EXTERNAL AS WELL AS INTERNAL, JANE MCASHEN ANNOUNCED THE FOLLOWING CHANGES: THE CASE WILL CHANGE FROM BLACK/SILVER TO SILVER/SILVER. THE GRAPHICS CHIP WAS REPLACED WITH A BETTER ONE TO MAKE IMAGES SHARPER. THE OLD GRAPHICS CHIP PRODUCED AN IRIS EFFECT AROUND LETTERS AND SYMBOLS ON THE SCREEN. 99/2 AND CC-40 DEMONSTRATIION

WAYNE WRIGHT (PRESIDENT) HAS BEEN IN CONTACT WITH ED WEISE. TI'S USERS GROUP COORDINATOR, ABOUT HAVING THE TI-99/2 AND THE CC-40 COMPACT COMPUTER DEMONSTRATED TO OUR USERS GROUP. IT WAS NOTED THAT IT WOULD TAKE ABOUT 3 TO 4 MONTHS LEAD TIME TO SET IT UP AND MR. WEISE WOULD ALSO LIKE TO GIVE A JOINT OR SEPARATE DEMONSTRATION TO THE JSC USERS GROUP. (CURRENTLY. WAYNE WRIGHT IS SETTING UP APRIL 10 FOR MR. WEISE TO COME.)

GUEST SPEAKER

TOME DASENBROCK, HUG MEMBER, WAS ON THE PROJECT DESIGN TEAM TO DEVELOP TI'S NEW PROFESSIONAL COMPUTER CALLED "PEGASUS". TOM DEMONSTRATED THE PROTOTYPE UNIT WHICH WAS EQUIPPED WITH A 10 MEGABYTE WINCHESTER DISK DRIVE AND 5 1/4" DOUBLE—SIDED DOUBLE DENSITY FLOPPY DISK DRIVE. THE COMPUTER IS EXPANDABLE TO 256K. THE COLOR MONITOR DEMONSTRATION WITH THE COMPUTER HAD A 700 X 300 LINE DOT TOUTION. THE COLOR MONITOR IS BEING MANUFACTURED BY PANASONIC. THE BUSINESS MPUTER WILL SUPPORT A BLACK AND WHITE OR COLOR MONITOR. TI IS WORKING ON A VOICE COMMAND UNIT FOR THE PROFESSIONAL COMPUTER WHICH SHOULD BE READY IN THE 3RD-4TH OTR. 1983. THE BASIC SYSTEM WITH 64K RAM MEMORY, 320K DOUBLE-SIDED, DOUBLE DENSITY DISK DRIVE, KEYBOARD + 12" MONOCHROME MONITOR RETAILS AT \$2595.

FLASH FLASH FLASH

PROGRAMMING HINTS

Lets talk about some simple commands this time for all the beginners who just are learning to program.

When you have a Basic program in memory and it is not running, you can see what the program is made of by typing 'list', and the program itself will scroll up the screen. To get the listing to stop you simply press the FUNCTION(FCTN) CLEAR(4) key. To continue the listing from where you stopped you must type 'LIST 300-', assumming that line 300 was the last line displayed before you stopped the listing. This means that the listing will start at line 300 and continue up to the end of the program. If you were to put another line number after the '-'. the listing would stop after that line was displayed.

LINE NUMBERS: for those who do not understand, are numbers at the beginning of each command you give the computer in a pro-

gram. The computer will do each command in numeric sequence unless told to do otherwise by one of the commands. (The computer will number the lines AUTOMATICALLY by simply typing in the command? NUM?, then ENTER.)

VARIABLES: they are an alphabetic (sometimes mixed with numbers) representation of a number value that can change or vary. For example: X=100, X is the Variable who's value is set to equal 100. If the next statement was: X=X+1 then the value of X is equal to 101 after the computer completed(EXECUTED) this statement.

CONSTANTS: these also are alpha-numeric replacements for numbers, but their value remains the same or constant. One is because it is often easier to remember a name than a complex value. As an example if you write one line that says:

PI=3.14159, then it is easier to say in a later command: CIRCUM=PI*DIAM, CIRCUM is a variable that represents the circumference of a circle and DIAM is a variable representing the diameter of that circle (you could have used DOG or CAT or anything else if you had wanted to but it is best to use something that helps you remember what the value is representing). Basically what a statement is saying is that the circumference of a circle is = to the given diameter of the circle times 3.14159 which is an expression you should know. The second reason for using constants is that if you use the same number a lot it saves space in memory. Each space in memory is called a BYTE. Each character you see on the screen uses one BYTE or space in memory. A number no matter how large or small it is, is saved in the memory using 9 BYTES. When you first give a CONSTANT a value it also uses 9 BYTES up, but each time you use it, only 2 BYTES are used to store a POINTER to the place in memory where the computer saves the 9BYTES value to be used. So if you use a number a lot in a program it is a nice practice to use CONSTANTS to represent them.

SAMPLE

188 CALL CLEAR

11# Pi=3.14159

12# PRINT "THIS PROGRAM PRINTS"

125 PRINT "THE CIRCUMFERENCE OF A CIRCLE."

130 PRINT

140 PRINT "WHAT IS THE DIAMETER:";

150 INPUT DIAM

168 CIRCUM=PI*DIAM

176 PRINT "THE CIRCUMFERENCE IS": CIRCUM

To exit the program just press the FCTN CLEAR(4). The line numbers are from 186 to 186. The only constant is PI. The two variables are CIRCUM and DIAM. The other commands will now be discussed. CALL CLEAR will erase everything from the screen. Print will put whatever you put between the quotes(") up on the screen as you have written it. The semicolon(1) after the second print statement lets the next thing to be put on the screen be placed after what has just been displayed, otherwise the next thing printed to the screen would be the on the next line. The INPUT statement takes whatever you type in on the keyboard and assigns it to the VARIABLE name after the word INPUT (in this case DIAM). GOTO just means that. The computer should go to the LINE NUMBER after the word GOTO (here it is 136) and do the command there instead of going on to the next LINE NUMBER.

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
