All TI products from all K's stores were gathered together and sold in bulk to another distributor. K's representative stated that the decision to no longer handle TI equipment was due to lack of sales. Now I can't argue with a retailer for wanting to get the most out of every square foot of floor space but I don't think K's really wanted to handle the 99/4A after the initial flood of sales last fall. The software K's had consisted of many old packages that had been around for years and anyone who had wanted these packages had already purchased a copy. Another fact that points to K's lack of support is the fact that there seems to be a growing number of third party hardware and software items available however none of these items ever appeared on K's shelves. Another thing to consider is that there are stores in Decatur and Springfield as well as Bloomington but, to the best of my knowledge, no one from K's contacted any of the user groups to find out what their members needed. Considering the fact that the TI equipment and software has already been sold and the shelf spaces allocated to another computer (ADAM) there is very little that you or I can do about the situation.
