Do you like to use a lot of graphics in your program? Do you ever go crazy from using too many "HCHAR" and VCHAR" commands? Well, relief has come! Why not use "FRINT" statements? "PRINT" statements are quick, easy, Byte saving, and time saving.

- 10 CALL CLEAR
- 20 CALL CHAR(120, "327EFFFFFFFFF7E3C") 30 CALL CHAR(121, "FF7E3C3C3C3C7EFF")
- 40 CALL HCHAR (22, 3, 120, 2)
- 50 CALL HCHAR (22, 5, 121, 3)
- 60 CALL HCHAR (22,8,120,4)
- 70 CALL HCHAR (23, 3, 121, 3)
- 80 CALL HCHAR (24, 3, 120, 5)
- 90 GOTO 90

Now run it, look at it and then delete lines 40, 50, 60, 70, 80, and 90. Then add:

TI IS OUT!

It took more than a year, but Texas Instruments is finally out of the home computer market. TI will continue to service its home computer, but vendors will no longer be able to obtain software from the company. Texas Instruments plans to bury thousands of over-produced cartridges, such as TI invaders and Munchman, in a landfill, but because the cartridges contain minute quanities of lead the actual burial will be carried out by a company that specializes in the disposal of products containing lead. Some vendors have stocked up on TI cartridges and expect to maintain inventory of most titles for some time to come. This article was from MICROpendium April 1985 issue. I assume TI (and MICROpendium) meant by "over-produced cartridges" in the sense that they produced more cartridges than computers therefore I can see there is no use for the extras. How many TI invaders cartridges could you use on one computer?

KEEPING IN COMMUNICATIONS

One way to keep in communication with other TI users is through telecommunication services accessible via telephone modem. free source is of course our TIBBS but there are other services that are accessible throughout our the country with many thousands of people being on line at once. Several of these sources are COMPUSERVE and THE SOURCE which have a TI section on each where TI owners go into and discuss the latest news or problems etc... Free software is also available by downloading it via the phone line off of the system. On Compuserve, every so often they have what is called a conference where many TI owners across the country are connected to the system to carry on a sort of user group meeting over the service. Except here we all just type our thoughts... These services offer bundles of more information such as business reports, stocks, weather forecasts and so much I could not explain it all here. However, there is one draw back, these services are not free. They cost about \$12 an hour during business hours and 6\$ an hour after business hours. These systems are accessible throughout the country by local numbers. The TI section on THE SOURCE is called Texnet and for more information about them write to Texnet at Soft Mail Inc., F.O. Box 745, Rockwall TX 75087. For Compuserye you can dial 452-8530 and when the system asks for a HOST type CIS, the ID number is 77770,10111 and your Password is FREE-DEMO for a free demonstrtion of Also you may buy a Compuserve starter kit at most Compuserve. places that sell computer equipment which will allow you 1 to 5 hours (depending on which kit you buy) of access to actually take a look around where as the free demonstration just tells you some of the things that are available.

MULTIPLAN PRINTER SETUP CODES

Most versions of Multiplan will allow you to send printer set-up codes (for condensed print; etc.) from the "Frint-Options-Setup" selection, but the TI-99/4A version only allows you to send "FIO" or "78232" plus related parameters such as ".15" or 100-4200"; otc. Here's how to send set-up codes to your printer income

Multiplan. Of course you can run a BASIC program to do it, but that is sometime a nuisance when you are in your spreadsheet.

- Create a new Multiplan spreadsheet with only the letter "A" in cell RiC1.
- Select the "Symbol Link" mode under "Transfer-Options" and save the worksheet to disk.
- 3. Use a disk editor such as DISKO (available from the club's library) and edit the sector with the saved worksheet. Set the display mode to ASCII and locate the "A" between quotes. IT will be the first "A". Now switch-to hex mode and replace the "A" (hex 41) with the printer control code in hex that you want to send to your printer; such as "OF" (which is decimal 15, or "SI") the code to cause the Gemini and many other printers to print condensed type. Save the changes made to disk.
- Restart Multiplan and re-load the spreadsheet with the "Transfer-Options" set to "Symbol Link".
- Change the "Transfer-Options" to "Normal" and "Save" the spreadsheet again.
- 6. When you are ready to insert the control code in any spreadsheet now all you have to do is "External Copy" the cell with the control code into the cell were you wish it to take effect. It is suggested that you do not "Link" the two spreadsheets. Set "External-Copy-Link" to "Off".

You could create one worksheet that contains all of the different codes that your printer uses and give the cells descriptive names and copy the ones you need when needed! Some codes require more than one byte so in that case, you will need to include a letter for each byte required in a cell on your first spreadsheet.

MUSIC SYNTHESIZER

Asgard Software, P.O. Box 10306, Rockville, MD'20850, has released a disk-based program called Music Synthesizer. The company also markets Stamp Manager and Balloon War. It plans to market an assembly language program called Schedule Manager in the near future. Music Synthesizer, \$16.95, features easy-to-follow menus and a simple note-placing scheme to create musical pieces using the TI99/4A. Features include the ability to save and merge parts of songs to create new compositions, a "play" mode, and a "sheet" system for maintaining data. This program gives the non-musically adept a whole new world within their computer, the company says. It requires a memory expansion, Extended BASIC and a disk system.

Ever find that you have blown the only unprotected copy of one of your Extended BASIC programs, but have a protected copy? With the aid of DISKO (a disk editor program available from the club's library) you can unprotect the program. Comparison of a protected program with an unprotected one reveals that the first four bytes of a protected program are "FREE' and an unprotected one are "OOID" so with DISKO it is a simple matter to modify these bytes.

SKETCH MATE

For anyone else who bought the Super Sketch graphics tablet for the 99/4A, I have good news. Although the Super Sketch was an excellent implementation of a graphics tablet; the software for it as it was originally designed restricted it by only allowing you to store the screen you had drawn to cassette. You could not load and save to disk and you could not dump the screen to a printer for a hard copy.

Amerisoft International has solved both of the problems. The Sketch Mate software they have written comes on a diskette. It can be loaded and run from either the Editor/Assembler or Extended Basic. The accesses to disk are extremely quick which you would expect. To save a screen takes about 15 seconds and to load a screen takes about 5 seconds.

But the most amazing feature about the program is when you dump the screen to a printer. The program actually dumps the screen in bit-map mode. This simply means that every single dot or pixel is printed out. Different colors have different graphic densities as well as different shades of the same color. As a result, all 15 colors of the 99/4A are printed out as different densities which allows the hard copy to not only represent different colors but also shading. The result is so dramatic you would have to see a printout to believe it.

There is one drawback. You have to have a Widget (cartridge port expander) in order to run Sketch Mate with Super Sketch.

Amerisoft International has really done an outstanding job with this assembly language program. It is extremely easy to use and it does truly unleash the power of Super Sketch which should have been written in the program in the first place. An excellent program and one which I recommend for any who have purchased or who might purchase Super Sketch in the future.

I also would like to mention the fact that Amerisoft International has some other excellent programs for the 99/4A. Anyone interested in their other programs can contact Information Associates at (800) 845-8375. They carry a lot of professionally written software for our computer and it would benefit all of us to supported both Amerisoft International and Information Associates. We need all the software we can get.
