

--- CASSETTE SETTINGS ---

--- Volume = WAY UP Tone = WAY DOWN ---

What??? Tone WAY DOWN !!! That's right. WAY DOWN as in all the way towards 0, or all the way towards "LO" as it is called on my GE recorder. But wait you say. The books all say to set TONE all the way up, or all the way towards HI. That's right; that's what the books all say.

So how did I come up with this idea? As seems to be the case with cassette recorders, I was having my share of problems in getting consistent performance in reading programs from my cassette recorders. The first recorder that I used was borrowed from my boy. It is a Panasonic mod.RQ-2107. Using the TI instructions resulted in a very narrow acceptable band of "Volume" settings (between 7 and 9). Any other "volume" setting just would not work. I lived with this problem for a while, then I purchased a GE Mod. 3-5152B. At the time GE did not yet have the "Dataset" which they now sell. The 3-5152B has a counter, and that's what I needed. With the GE recorder the acceptable volume settings improved, however I still had problems reading some tapes, including tapes purchased with programs already on them as well as some tapes that I referred to as my "garbage" tapes. These could only be read 1 out of 10 times, on a good day. Does any of this sound familiar?

What makes one tape readable, and another not readable? That seemed to be the 6 million dollar question. So I brought my cassette recorder to work, where I was able to look at the output signal with an oscilloscope. In reviewing both "good" as well as "garbage" tapes, I could see that the garbage tapes were producing more signals that did not resemble anything regular in shape or level. Reducing the "tone" setting, while increasing the "volume", produced a signal that most resembles the two frequencies that represent the computer data. (With a cassette recorder, 0's and 1's are represented by two different frequencies, as in telephone modems.) It's been a while since I did this, but as I remember the lead tone is represented by a frequency of 600HZ. (cycles per second), with data tones of 1200HZ., and 2400HZ. Please don't hold me to these numbers. As I say it's been a while, and of course I didn't write anything down.

Forget all the technical mumble jumble. The important thing is that these settings worked, and they continue to work. I have not had one misread. Not one, not with "good" tapes, not with "garbage" tapes. I consider this something of a miracle. It's been over a year since I started using this method, and my son now has his Panasonic recorder hooked to his TI. He got one of the \$60 machines for Christmas 1983. We had to shake the sand out of this recorder before we could use it, but, you guessed it, "Volume" is all the way UP, "Tone" is all the way DOWN. And it works great.

So if you are using a cassette recorder, try it, who knows, it might work for you too. My next article will deal with my experiences with my new green video monitor (not all good). See you then.

Enter the program in any three consecutive screens of the FORTH

After TIMER is set, enter the word RUN (this will begin the game)

Remember that your opponent will be racing around the screen
collecting numbers at the same time you are. The game will end when
the timer reaches zero. At this time you may give the TIMER a

These LOADS apply to XB WITH EXPMEM only, except where noted, and MAY, repeat MAY work for the E/A module, and/or MINI/MEM.

```
**CALL LOAD(-31806,16)..DISABLES FCTN QUIT KEY
**CALL LOAD(-31806,64)..KILLS SPRITES
**CALL LOAD(-31806,32)..DISABLES AUTO SOUND PROCESSING
**CALL LOAD(-31806,128).DISABLES FCTN QUIT, SOUND AND SPRITES
**CALL LOAD(-31806,0)...RESTORE ANY OR ALL OF THE ABOVE
**CALL PEEK(-31974,A,B).in the command mode. Then..PRINT A6+B-1776.
```

This is roughly the equivalent to the SIZE command in XB. The 1776 figure is the approx. overhead in TI BASIC. XB has slightly more. If you have ever had a very,very long program and are unable to run it with your disk drives, this is for you. It is much easier with MINI-MEM, and that explanation follows.

```
**CALL LOAD(-31888,63,255)::NEW..frees memory/disables disks.
**CALL LOAD(-31888,55,215)..then, RUN, NEW or EDIT to restore.
```

This is equivalent to CALL FILES(0) in XB (which of course you can't do.) and has the effect of completely disabling the disk drives, and freeing up the memory allocated to the disks. Any calls to the drives, once the LOAD has been invoked, will FREEZE THE COMPUTER, and you will have to turn it off to restore. Involking this command prior to loading your long program via cassette, will negate your having to turn you PES on and off again.

MINI-MEM....

With the mini-mem installed, its even neater, and you can save your very long programs on disk and use them again, WITHOUT having to turn your PES on and off. Here's how.

1. use the call load command above.
2. load your long program via cassette. Then save EXPMEM2.
3. Restore your disk by typing CALL FILES(1).....NEW....then OLD EXPMEM2.
4. Save to DSK1. under whatever name you desire.
5. When you wish to use the long program, merely CALL FILES(1), OLD DSK1.PROGRAM, SAVE EXPMEM2, CALL LOAD(-31888,63,255), NEW, OLD EXPMEM2.
6. Run your program.
7. If you still get a MEMORY FULL message at that point....sorry, I can't offer any more than that.

To restore the DRIVES without turning the PES off and on, use the same location with number 55. CALL LOAD(-31888,55,215)::NEW or RUN or EDIT

```
**CALL PEEK(-28672,A)..Checks for speech synthesizer. If attached, returns
a value of 255 if speech synthesizer is attached, and 127 if speech
synthesizer is not attached.
```

I have received info from other sources that, depending on the system, the return will be 96 if attached and 0 if not attached. Fool around with this location to determine what value is returned on YOUR system.

```
**CALL LOAD(-32630,128)..returns you to the title screen (not recognizable
due to graphics not restored, but its there.
```

****CALL LOAD(-31961,149)::END or STOP..will reset you XBASIC, search DSK1 for a program called LOAD and RUN that program if it is found.**
****CALL LOAD(-31961,51)::END..resets to the title screen, with full graphics[^]implimented.**
****CALL LOAD(-32572,1)..produces a "MUSHIE" keyboard.**
****CALL LOAD(-32572,128)..disables the keyboard.**
****CALL LOAD(-31878,X)..where X is the highest number of sprites you are using. Useful for halting SPRITES >X, or, if X=0 then brings all sprites to a grinding halt.**
****CALL LOAD(-31806,X)..same as above, but reputed to work a little faster to accomplish the same task.**

This next one takes some experimentation, and it's use, is again, dubious.
****CALL LOAD(-31745,0)..produces a frozen screen, which, after a few seconds, blanks entirely. Restore by pressing (FCTN -).**
****-32443,-32187,-31931,-32699 are located in SCRATCH-PAD ram, and are self-duplicating. Whatever is found to be at >8100-81FF will also be found at >8200-82FF etc. Therefore loading EITHER of these locations with a specific value, will accomplish the following:**
i.e. **CALL LOAD(-32699,X)..(within body of program) where X =**
2..activates ON WARNING NEXT command.
4..activates ON WARNING STOP command.
16.activates TRACE function.
64.activates ON BREAK NEXT command.

****CALL LOAD(-31866,33,0)..then SIZE..makes it seen as if you have just gotten something for nothing, but don't believe it. Try other values, and prove it to yourself.**

****CALL LOAD(-31868,0)..(withing the body of a program)..If the program is halted with a FCTN 4 (break), listing the program will be impossible, as will RUNning the program again. You may, however CON to resume the program.**

****CALL LOAD(-31748,1)..normal cursor speed, and normal duration for WARNING tones and INPUT beeps. Loading with a larger number makes the cursor blink faster, and increases the length of the tones. Try values 2 or 18 for fairly good results. Using 0 (zero) halts cursor and disables tones.**

I'm sure there are a lot more interesting and useful locations to be played with, than what I have been able to collect over the past few months. I have (4) four locations which are used to "unprotect" protected extended basic programs. I will give all four locations to anyone who can supply me with one(1) good location, different from those detailed above, as well as other uses for those locations. Contents include 13 type fonts, 14 text display routines, 12 sorts and shuffles, 9 data saving and reading routines, 9 wipes, 8 pauses, 5 music, 2 protection, etc., etc., all for just \$19.95 postpaid!

New programs this month -

TCX-1058 SCRUM, now available in Extended Basic. I'm told that this challenging puzzle-game has been programmed for other computers under the name Merlin. I haven't seen it, but I don't think you can beat my version - it's 511 puzzles in one!

TCX-1137 SOUNDMAKER, a very versatile utility program to develop sound effects, then save them in the form of actual program lines. Requires Extended Basic; disk only.

I must first thank all those newsletter editors and other users' group officers who are trying so hard

to help me keep my kitchen

table enterprise alive. One users group reprinted my entire catalog in their newsletter, another is putting it on their BBS, another made me an honorary life member, many others have mentioned and recommended my software in their newsletters.

Unfortunately, all that support hasn't helped very much. From reading the editorials in many newsletters, I can easily see that most users groups consist of a few dedicated hard-working individuals and a lot of.....well, frankly, freeloaders. And freeloaders don't buy software!

To borrow a few quotable quotes from the newsletters, "too many getters and not enough givers", and "users are users!". That is why users groups are fading away, software producers are going out of business, and the TI-99/4A will die before its time.

The DATA elements to be typed in line 320, separated by commas, are - the "at" sign above the L, the left brace on the front of the F key, the

ampersand above the 7, the right brace on the front of the 6, the carat sign above the 6, the tilde on the front of the W, the asterisk above the 8, the whatsit? on the front of the A, the period, and the backslash on the front of the Z. If you don't want to revert to FILL and ADJUST, delete the second statement in line 300.

Beware the A6 bug! The asterisk in the above program is transliterated because of an odd quirk of II-writer which causes it to change A:256 into A6! It happened to me, and I've seen it in two published programs.

If my Autoloader gives you a couple of asterisks instead of the number of sectors, it's because you have files over 49 sectors long. You can change the image in line 170 to ### if you want to.

Here is probably the last word on the challenge to write a 1-line XBasic program which would scramble the numbers 1 to 255 into a random sequence without duplication. This one runs in 17 seconds!




