By the way, adhesive-backed Velcro really keeps things like extra drives in place. Just peel and stick.

More shining knights to my rescue--I took my HRD over to Curt and told him I thought it needed batteries and he loaned me one to use till mine is fixed. Bob Osterloh set up a separate library sector for the NL files to make it easier for me to find them, Tom gave me a program to transfer IBM files so I can read them in II-Mriter, and Bill Berendts sent me a second file for this month's NL. Robert Gabriel fixed the NL1000, Von inked two ribbons for me, and I'm in business again. The NL this month is definitely a team effort.

The action is SO FAST, when I arrow down to flag a file for loading, almost every time I have to back up. I want to show you but I need some more time to get totally organized. I need to put some more of my desktop publishing files into the FUNNELWEB menu and move or omit the things I don't use. IT'S SO NICE not to have to type in the file name in the formatter, Load File, Save File, etc. though I do need to configure it for PIO.LF instead of RS232.BA=4B00.LF.

Three-years later, I've realized that the CSGD font file CHARPIC on UDSA with all the weird little graphics characters is for making top/bottom borders of individual or several characters. I tried making side borders too, but I couldn't get the beginning and end characters to go all the way to the sides. I guess a CHARPIC character is wider than a space character, but I don't know how to get around it. Anybody else know?

WONDERFUL NEW HARDWARE!!! WONDERFUL NEW SOFTWARE !!!

Guess what arrived in the mail today from that dear, Charles Good--FUNNELMEB v4.31 for both 40/80 columns, with corrections made to DISKREVIEW which contains a complete set of disk management functions and sector

editor. At the two central menus, move the cursor next to an entry, press (enter) and the program boots. From a disk directory, move the cursor next to the name on a RUNable program, press R, and RUN the program; press V and view any file. Foreign language character sets can replace C1 and C2 sets on screen by going to a central menu and press F9, answer N to the QUIT prompt, and you will be given the opportunity to specify an alternate character set. C3-C7 are arc'd on the disk. There's even more, but I'll wait until next time.

Charlie Rinehart should have news for us Thursday night on the ESD hard/floppy disk controller he ordered. The price is \$225 and it controls up to 4 hard drives and 4 floppy drives in all densities. Maybe we can get a discount for club orders. Wouldn't this be a nice Christmas present for you/us. ESD Corp., P.O. Box 23805, Washington, DC 22026-3805.

Chicago's II Faire brought out fantastic new hardware and software developments.

The RAVE PF/2 hox with the 32-bit expansion hus for emulating a PC, Apple, Atari, Nintendo, etc. is shipping. \$369 plus shipping and handling for the "B" model which I would need for my 4A, and I'll need a Rave keyboard (IBM style) as the II motherboard fits inside the PE/2 box; the 200-matt power supply can support up to three internal floppies and a 3.5" hard drive. If you have a Geneve already, you only need the PE/2 box, Model "A" which sells for \$309 + s/h because you've already got a keyboard without a firehose. Would you believe, according to the Nov. micropendium, it only takes a screwdriver to make the changeover. Now I can handle that I betcha! Maybe there'll be a package deal available. Rave 203-871-7843.

TI-Image Maker (I.I.M.) is an expansion board that fits into the console and replaces the TMS9918 video ship with a V9958 Video Display Processor. This chip lets the console support an 80-column RGB monitor: 4"x3", 192K of video RAM, analog RGB video monitor port and an external analog/digital expansion port for future DPA products, such as a digitizer. Can display up to 19,268 colors by using the YJK system display. An on-board

chip removes software compatibility problems. T.I.M. comes with 80-column FUNNELWEB, 80-column TELCO, and a GIF viewer to view GIF pictures in high resolution mode, plus other programs. \$179 from Dasis Pensive Abacutors, 432 Jarvis St. Suite 502, Toronto, Ontario, Canada M47-2H3; or call 416-960-0925.

OPA also showed "Gismo", a cartridge expander which allows switching via software and also allows access routines from one cartridge while using another. Ex: accessing TEII speech capabilities while in XB.

Asgard's M1D1 Master Interface, designed by Mike Maksimik of the Chicago II User Group, supports up to 16 channels simultaneously. The interface uses an RS232 cable to link the II PEB to an electronic key-board or other interfaceable device. Musical scores can be written using a word processor, or the keyboard can generate the score. Music files from the PC world can even be imported for use with the M1DI interface. Everything can be saved to disk. The TI version is a cartridge \$44.95. A cassette version will be available in the future. Asgard, P.O. Box 10306, Rockville, MD 20849 or 703-255-3085.

Asgard also had new programs, including: Rick Runner, Tournament Solitaire, Waterworks, Castle Darkholm, Rattlesnake Bend, Artist Font Maker, Sports Pics, Yet Another Paint Program (YAPP), nine enhancement packages for Page Pro 99, Screen Preview for Ti-Writer, The Animator, and Link, a cartridge-based terminal emulator which gives up to 1200 baud. More, but no room.

MOCK CHAMPAGNE SLUSH

OB
CHAMPAGNE. SLUSH. MOCK CHAMPAGNE

.75 C. sugar, more or less
3 qts water
1 bottle (32 oz) cranberry juice
cocktail
2.5 C. pineapple juice
i C. freshly squeezed orange juice
l can (12 oz) lemon-lime soda
Lemon slices for qarnish

Combine sugar & water in saucepan, heat while stirring to dissolve sugar. Cool.

In large container, combine fruit juice and sugar mixture. Freeze until slushy.

To serve, add soda & lemon slices; stir well.

Yield: 12 cups or 16-6 oz or 8-12 oz servings

DRI-MAI-TAI NA MAI TAI, DRI, DRY, COCKTAIL

3 oz. club soda
1 oz. freshly squeezed orange juice
1 oz. freshly squeezed lemon juice
1 oz. pineapple juice
1 oz. simple syrup
.5 oz. grenadine syrup
.5 oz. fresh squeezed lime juice
.75 C. crushed ice
Orange cartwheel slice
Marachino cherry

SIMPLE SYRUP: 2 C. sugar 1 C. water

SIMPLE SUGAR: Boil water & sugar, stir to dissolve sugar & continue to boil gently for 5 minutes. Makes 2 cups. Can be refrigerated up to 6 months.

COCKTAIL:

In blender, combine all ingredients blending until smooth. Pour into tall (12 oz) glass. Garnish with orange cartwheel & cherry threaded on a long wooden skewer.

YIELD: one 11 oz serving.

WHIZZY SOUR NA WHIZZY SOUR, SOUR, COCKTAIL

2 C. fresh squeezed orange juice
25 C. fresh squeezed lemon juice
25 C. marachino cherry juice
1 L. lemon-lime soda or club soda
Orange slices and marachino cherries for garnish

Combine fruit juices, pour into ice cube trays & freeze. To serve, place 3 or 4 frozen cubes in each 8 oz glass, fill with soda, stir well and garnish with orange slices & cherries.

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CHRISTMAS PUNCH NA CHRISTMAS, PUNCH, FRUIT

16 C. Wwater
16 C. sugar
8 qts fresh or frozen strawberries,
without sugar
4 C. peach or apricot nectar
2 C. freshly squeezed orange juice
1 C. freshly squeezed lemon juice
3 qts club soda luse seltzer for low
salt intake)
3 qts club soda, frozen into cubes

Boil water & sugar 'till no crystals remain (make sure to wash down sides of pan). Boil for 5 minutes 'til a sugar syrup is formed. Cool & set aside.

Pour the peach/apricot nectar, orange & lemon juice into tARGE mixing bowl or pot. As you stir, add sugar syrup until you get a very strong sweet/sour flavor lyou must make this base syrup so it stands up against being cut with the club soda/seltzer.)

When it's strong enough & still carries a light lemon flavor, set aside sugar syrup for possible future use. Cool the fruit mixture in the refrigerater.

At party time, pour 1 quart of mixture into punch bowl, add generous amount of ice & fill with soda. Float 2 quarts of strawberries in punch for decorations. YIELD: Serves 30-40 people.

For that annual party when friends drop in to spread the cheer, set a table of goodies to munch from. Some chile, spiced just enough to be tangy, but not enough to dull the taste buds to the rest of the table, accompanied by ordinary hot dogs for the less adventurous provides the need for something substantial.

The snackables would be cookies--not just one or two varieties, but a whole table full. Keep the party on an even keel by serving Spiced Cranberry Lemonade in place of the more potent liquids.

Try the following recipes for something different and don't forget to add your own special favorites.

VIENNESE SANDWICH COOKIES Oven: 300 deg Keywords: COOKIES, SANDWICH COOKIES

INGREDIENTS:

1.5 C. softened butter or margarine 0.75 C. sifted powdered sugar 3 C. all-purpose flour 1 IBS grated orange peel 1.5 IBS orange juice

LEMON FILLING: 0.5 C. softened butter or margarine 2 C. sifted powdered sugar 3 TBS lemon juice 1111111111111111111111 CHOCOLATE FROSTING: 3 squares (1 oz ea) semismeet chocolate 1 TBS butter or margarine

INSTRUCTIONS:

Cream butter, gradually adding powdered sugar, at medium speed 'til light and fluffy. Add flour, orange rind & juice. Beat well, cover & chill for 2 hours.

Place 1" balls of dough on a greased cookie sheet spaced 2" apart. Flatten to 1/8 inch with wet flat bottomed glass. Bake 14-16 minutes 'til lightly browned & remove to wire racks to cool.

LEMON FILLING: Cream butter, gradually adding sugar. Add enough lemon juice to reach desired spreading consistency.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING: Combine chocolate & butter in double boiler, stirring constantly until melted.

Evenly spoon 1.5 tsp lemon fill on half of cookies. Cover with 2nd cookie and spread top with chocelate Frosting. YIELD: 3 dozen cookies

RIBBON CODKIES DVEN: 350 deg KEYWORDS: RIBBON COOKIES, COOKIES

INGREDIENTS:

1 C. softened butter or margarine 1.5 C. sugar 1 egg l tspn vanilla extract

2.5 C. all-purpose flour

1.5 tspn baking powder

0.5 tspn salt

0.25 C.diced red candied cherries

0.25 C. melted semisweet choc morsels 0.25 C. chopped pecans (optional)

0.25 C. diced green candied cherries

INSTRUCTIONS:

Line 9 X 5 X 3" pan with alum foil. Cream butter, gradually add sugar, beat well medium speed. Add egg & vanilla. Mix well. Add combined flour, baking powder & salt to mix gradually, mixing until blended. Dough will be stiff. Divide into thirds. Add cherries to 1/3 of dough; stir well. Press into lined pan. Add chocolate & nuts to 1/3 dough; stir well. Press into pan nver cherry layer. Add green cherries to 1/3 dough; stir well & press into pan over other layers. Cover & chill at least 3 hours. Invert pan, remove dough & cut in half lengthwise. Cut each section crosswise into 1/8" slices. Place 1.5" apart on ungreased conkie sheet. Bake 10-12 min. Remove to wire racks to cnol. Y!ELD: 4.5 dozen cookies

ORANGE CHEESE SPREAD Byen: NA Keywords: CHEESE SPREAD, ORANGE SPREAD

INGREDIENTS:

1 11 oz can mandarin oranges, undrained 2 8 oz packages cream cheese, softened 2 IBS orange flavored liqueur 0.25 tspn orange extract

INSTRUCTIONS:

Drain oranges, reserving 15 slices for garnish. Chop remaining sections and drain again.

Combine cream choese, liqueur & orange extract; beat at medium speed until blended. Stir in chopped oranges.

Spoon mixture into a 2.5 C. mold lined with plastic wrap. Chill.

Invert cheese onto serving plate; remove plastic wrap and garnish with reserved orange sections. Serve with ginger snaps. YIELD: 2.25 cups

SPICED CRANBERRY LEMONADE

LEMONADE, CRANBERRY JUICE, SPICED DRINK

INGREDIENTS:

6 whole cloves (more or less to taste) 1 two inch stick of cinnamon 3.5 €. Water 2 G. cranberry juice cocktail .33 E. sugar 1 60z can frozen lemonade concentrate thawed and undiluted Orange slices

INSTRUCTIONS:

Combine spices in a cheesecloth bag. Combine water, cranberry juice & sugar in a Dutch oven; add spice bag & bring mixture to a boil, stirring 'til sugar dissolves Remove from heat; add lemonade, stirring well. Discard spice hag, serve hot & garnish with orange slices. YIFID: 1.5 quarts

Last month I ended with a program that printed my three initials "JFM" as a single graphic character. This time I'll expand the program.

ABOVE ARE FOUR OF THE MANY GRAPHIC MODES AVAILABLE.

To the left you will see four graphics which actually consist of nine 8x8 graphic characters, three in the top row and three rows high. And, since there are 8 eight bit characters in each graphic characters. ter, there are 72 characters sent to the printer to print a single com-

the printer to print a single complete image printed (8x3x3). The top graphic is in the Standard-density mode. The second one down is in Double-density graphics, the third down is in Double-speed double-density graphic mode, and the bottom is in Quadruple-density graphic mode. graphic mode.

You can create even much larger graphics either as I did using a CHR\$(xxx) or by creating a series of data statements and raeding them into a DIMension and then printing out that file to a printer.

The program below was designed to be simple to understand rather than short/fast. From what you learned in

PRINTERS #4, line #120 is setting the line spacing so that the 8 dot high character will not have white horizontal lines between them.

Line 130 simply is used by my demonstration program to select Standard-density graphics mode first and line 140 is a definition of commands so I can use a brief command to reimplement the graphic mode, 6MODE\$, seen in lines 150, 180 and 210. Actual printing is done in lines 150 through 230. Lines 240 to 300 are there to change the modes described above. Lines 110 through 230 will do a standard graphic printout.

The line of graphics above was created with the GRAPHIC command "ESC,k,n1,n2". along with the computer doing what it's supposed to do, CALCULATE. Line 140 does the calculations to put the dots in the sinusoidal pattern. Try leaving ".cr" out of line 100 to see what affect this has on the printer's ability to print a clean graphic on paper.

The main subject here is, how-ever, the VARIABLES of and of in in the GRAPHICS command. The CHR \$(27)&"K" set the graphic, but the printer must also know how many columns must be "RESERVED" for graphics, nl ranges from 0 to 255 columns, while n2 represents/indicates how many of the of the 256 column blocks must be reserved, i.e. n2 acts as a carry each time n1 counts exceed

a remainder of 178. ni now 178 and n2 is the value of 1. Example 2 is a single 31-column cycle which causes nl to be 31 and n2 to be O. Example 3 is here to further inforce the pattern. As the n values change, you will see line 120 change to accomodate the changing number of columns. Divide the number of columns by the number of columns/cycle. This is important. The number of columns must match the number reserved, or the printer will not function properly. The program to the left has one simple function, and that is to calculate the ni and n2 values from the total column numbers

that you decide you need. Again, I am not a programmer, but wanted this program to be in console BASIC as are all the examples here. Because some of you have wide carriages, the wider line can be calculated

Now you will find enjoyment and satisfaction in masterian the printers.

NEW-AGE/99 #3 (SPIRIT DF 99)

I often chuckle at doomsayers, but sometimes they irk me.

I don't think anyone quest ions the fact that the APPLE, AMIGA, IBM and clones all have more commercial software and support than the 4A. Walk into any book store and look at the magazines. Go into a department store and look at the racks of software packages. Or into an electronics store and peruse the computers, cards, drives, other hardware and software items. AND THE PRICES!

No question; the stuff's there. And some of us succumb to those temptations. Don't get me wrong. At work and at the homes of friends and relatives I get plenty of opportunities to play and work with these other machines, and enjoy my time on them for the most part. But, even then and even when I attend the other computer user groups or fairs, I don't have the feeling that I do with similar TI activities.

The emotion - very much in evidence at II get togethers is absent at Apple and IBM gatherings. There are subtle, important other differences, too.

When I look at the OTHER software or OTHER hardware, I wonder if most TIERS would pay those humongous prices or whether most TIERS would want to trouble to learn these new ways of Hi-tech wizardry. For the most part the TIERS don't do that now.

An example: The Apple IIG is #II49. (That's without the 5.0 (NOTE THE CONSTANT UPGRADING THAT SEEMS TO BE A COMPLAINT IN SOME CIRCLES!) and a \$50 Systems disk that's required to operate the machine. NOTHING resides in memory.

Let's say you want a word processor for it, as word processing is the most common use of non-husiness computers. APPLEWORKS, (the most popular WP for all Apples) is another \$250. (No percentage point, folks. It' two-hundred-fifty dollars, plus tax!). Will the WORKS give you 40/BO columns for those of us (oldtimers?) who LIKE 40 because the letters are large and clean and easy to read? Nope. Try reading on an APPLE monitor.

Lar you flip around, as you can with the fairware: NNELWEB, for example, and lead up such utilities as DM-1000, Disk Utilities, AR!hiver, other languages (Assembly, c., FORIH), other sources (tape, cartridge, etc.)? Nope. There are no tapes and cartridges for those OTHER machines, anyway, but the WORKS doesn't let you configure any possibilities outside the provided environments. How about modified fonts, underlining, doublestrike? ALL available with FUNNELWEB, even more if you use the fairware PLUS! within the FWB environment.

And speed? The IIGS is slow, very slow. But for an additional #399 you can buy a IRANSWARP GS card that'll speed up WORKS and other GS items to reasonable, runnable speed.

Can you slip into graphics with WORKS? Nope, but FWB's II text can easily emigrate to PAGEPRO for all kinds of graphic/text manipulations (or PP can stand alone for similar structuring).

You must use PRINT SHOP separately to get some graphic; still, not with the page puscibilities. For that you'd need the user UNFRIENDLY NIWSENDM. Add another \$400, not counting the graphics. The kind that are Public Domain through TIPS for the II, say another \$500 easily. How much is that decidedly inferior word processor now? Still under \$3000? That's not bad as prices go in the

computer world out there. Check OTHER computer prices.

Why would Tiers consider THAT an upgrade? We certainly wouldn't pay those prices for software for our superior machine: FWB donation \$20; PLUS! donation \$10; TIPS and 5,000 graphics are FREE; PAGEPRO is under \$25. Grand total for us Tiers, maybe 50 bucks at the most.

Most Tlers don't have RAMDISKS or RAVE keyboards or hard drives or the GENEVE upgrade that includes 640k RAM, truly astounding graphic capabilities, a superb keyboard and all other kinds of great stuff, including II compatibility (as much as most clones have with IBM). And yet EACH of these thim: are less than a chuple pieces of software for Olimin computers.

Most Tiers (in all honesty) don't even pay for the fairware they use, so I can't see them spending \$50 to \$800 per piece of software after spending a couple thousand for another system, no matter how great the software is. Look at the magnificent under \$25 commercial software items for the TI: TI-BASE, PAGEPRO, TI-ARTIST PLUS!, for examples. Do most Tiers who have disk drives own these three items? Not by a long shot!

Have most of the Tler who use Tony McGovern's FUNNELWEB, Barry Boone' ARCHIVER, John Birdwell's DISK UTILITIES, or Canada's DM-1000 sent decent (or any) fairware contributions for the constant updates? Nope.

Do most Tlers subscribe to MICROpendium or ASSARD NEWS, the only two magazines we have devoted exclusively to the 112 Nope.

Do most Ilers even belong to user groups? Nope. Not even by mail, though that is the best source of disk, tape, and text materials, not to mention the monthly newsletter connection, that money can buy (also under \$25).

Do most liers take advantage of the massive sources available across their phone through inexpensive modems?

My feeling is why, if Ilers are not taking advantage of all the things that are available NOW and at a lot smaller cost, would they even want to move (up?) to more expensive machines?

It makes me think about a comment by Keith Jarrett, considered by many music critics to be the greatest pianist of this century. Because he plays jazz and classical and newage and a style of improve that is inimitable, he was asked why he didn't play the electronic keyboard. "I haven't learned everything about the acoustic piano, yet", he said. If HE hasn't learned everything about the acoustic piano yet, no one in the world has!

But I feel this way about my II. When people ask me why I dan't move up, I first give my speech about moving up to Apples or clones or whatever is not necessarily UP! Then I think of the real reason: I haven't finished learning everything I want to learn and doing everything I want to do with my 4A yet.

Even if everything relating to the TI ceased instantly; nothing more being created; all user groups stopped; the complete TI end--even if... most of us would still be using and learning and enjoying our perfectly wonderful computer for a long time to come.

But such a scenario is NOT heading our way in the near future. There are too many of us who WANT to stay with this gem of a machine.

I think we all have a long way to go yet, and I am enjoying the journey.
