## Pillings Lock Marina AGM. (A review)

**At 9am this fine Friday morning 1<sup>st</sup> April** my destination by train was from my hometown in Crewe County Cheshire to Pillings Lock Marina Leicestershire with a large suitcase full of electronic TI equipment and another small suitcase with my clothes and items to keep me going until the following Monday, distance by train about 150km with a cost of about £40 return and a change of trains four times which included a stop at Birmingham International to meet up with our Contributing Editor Berry Harmsen from the Netherlands, and a very dear friend of mine, as he had just arrived from Amsterdam by KLM.

**We had a coffee** and something to eat at the station top

just to keep us going and then by train on to Nuneaton and then Coventry then Leicester and then our last stop at Barrow upon Soar where our very good friend Ronald Kalwij was waiting in his car to give us a lift to Pillings Lock

distance about 1km, Ronald had also traveled from the Netherlands by Boat with his car about three days before and he was staying in a guest house in Loughbrough about 2km distance.

**On arrival at Pilling Lock** at 3pm about 100mt from the main carriageway there is a large car park and at the water's edge is the Apartment Building quite large with washing, cleaning and Maintenance facilities for the Boats at the rear and at the front overlooking the Marina is the Apartments above and below the Boat Hire and Trips office and a wonderful medium sized top class

Once inside our Apartment Penthouse suite it was up the stairs with our suitcases and while Berry was in his room unpacking getting ready I began the task of putting my TI portable kit together which included a Beige TI console converted from USA to UK Motherboard, a standalone TI ss/sd disk controller, a speech synthesizer, a Boxcar 32k memory, Cumana dual 3 1/2”

When eventually I had unpacked my smaller suitcase in my room we were then back into the main living area for the start of our Workshop/AGM, Trevor was on his laptop, Ronald was on his TI console with cf7+ and a 15”small screen LCD TV/Monitor and he had an issue with this TV/Monitor with some of the colored squares on the TI title screen of different sizes he was using a TI **modulator made especially for the European market with a European/Scart Type socket**

external floppy disk drives, a pair of Gemini Mini Gemstik Joysticks, then fixed all this up to my Cello 15” LCD TV/Monitor and after last year converting this console to VGA, I connected up to my TV/Monitor **VGA for PICTURE IMAGE** and

going into the back of the TV/Monitor, he soon had the modulator

box open and doing plenty of adjustments but to no avail he even tried his second TV/Monitor which was only showing a black/white screen and slightly off centre. Trevor was doing his best to get a good Wi-Fi signal in the apartment but with difficulty, so had the bright idea of increasing the signal to a reasonable standard with the purchase of a booster, on his return from Loughbrough he had purchased a **BT N300 range extender which was plugged into a 3 pin wall socket** and after trying and re-trying was eventually able to increase the signal in the apartment, Berry set up his Laptop as signal was increased. Trevor had booked a table for our late dinner at the restaurant below at about 7pm they were lovely people serving and the food was exceptional and by the time dinner was over we retired to our apartment and at about 11pm our first day of the AGM was over.



Berry was giving out envelopes to everyone which included a **DVD + RW** from the **CHICAGO FAIRE 2015** and was quite full of useful information such as a **Cartridge Manipulator, Floppy Emulator, Chicago Software Library, Files In Linux** and much much more, when we had discussed about the disk contents I was then able to set up my TI System with our Group Digital

Projector I had brought in my suitcase it is a **DLP HP vp6120** which



at twelve years old shows a very reasonable 720p image we hooked this up to my TI by VGA for picture and COMPONENT for sound and after triple checking connections all went well with a very acceptable 70

largest self-hosted blogging tool in the world, used on millions of sites and seen by tens of millions of people every day, you download and install yourself. It started out as just a blogging system, but has evolved to be used as full content management system and so much more through the thousands of plug-in and widgets and themes, and limited only by your imagination. (And tech chops.)

WordPress was born out of a desire for an

elegant, well-architected personal publishing system built on



**PHP** and **MySQL** and licensed under the **GPLv2** (or later). It is the official successor of **b2/cafeblog** and is fresh software, but its roots and development go back to 2001. After Trevors demonstration it

## ***FROM The CHAIRMANS CHAIR...***

**The AGM was an absolute cracker**, we hired a Penthouse suite at Pillings lock, which came with some member's accommodation. The Penthouse overlooks the Mariana and is very light and airy. All who attended (see the minutes in this issue) agreed it was a very nice place with good communication and access. Below we even had a restaurant. We may be having it there again next year, depending on the price.

**Well it has been some time since I laid hands on my TI**, it normally fires up straight away. However looks like I have a bad power supply. Then it came to the realisation that this computer, a TI99/4a was bought by me in late 1981 from ASDA (part of the Walmart Group ) here in Lincoln UK, and now nearly 35 years old... What other machine was built to last so long. Then I thought well there was an early TI, so I have searched for an article to relate to this earlier version of this bomb proof machine. Here it is thanks to **Tom Wills** and his website, plus the contributors in the text.

### **The TI-99/4**

**The TI-99/4 was Texas Instrument's first attempt into the home computer market.** This computer was originally equipped with a Zenith monitor and sold for a little over \$1000 which was pretty expensive for a computer in 1979. **The TI-99/4**

**had an entirely different keyboard than the 99/4A.** There were a total of 41 keys which includes the orange Shift and Enter keys and there was even an extra Space key next to the "A". Now get this, above the number 6 on the 99/4, there is a comma character, but on a 99/4A and modern computers there is a carrot. However, the 99/4's keys were not the normal "typewriter"-like keys found on the 99/4A, they are almost identical to the modern TI calculators. The first time I used a TI-92 I noticed how similar the keys were in shape compared to the 99/4 and they even had the little dips in the centre.

**The problem with the TI-99/4 is that there was no Function key to access the Redo command, Reset command, etc.** Instead, the 99/4 used the Shift key to access these special functions. For example, you would hit "Shift-C" to break out of a program or "Shift-Q" to restart the computer. I can remember one time that I accidently hit "Shift-Q" in a

BASIC program I was writing thinking that it would capitalize the letter "Q" but instead it restarted the computer making me very angry since I would normally type for 2 hours a day and all that work would be gone! But now I am very careful, I always save my work after typing in 100 or



so lines just so it doesn't happen again. Maybe the TI-99/4 taught me a lesson on saving work that I might not have learned to this day if it wasn't for that machine.

If you are wondering how I memorized that "Shift-Q" means to restart the computer or "Shift-C" breaks a program, it is not by the mistakes I made (May have helped) **but by the black thin sheets that would cover the entire keyboard and let you know the special functions**. There were also game overlays that would tell you which keys to push to move a character around or if you are player 1 or 2.


**The 99/4 yet had another drawback.** It could ONLY write in UPPER case letters! But when the 99/4A came out, TI expanded the ASCII character set to include UPPER and lower case letters along with the { } ~ and ^ characters. There was a little program that I made on the 99/4A in BASIC that went like this:

**100 Print "THIS IS THE 99/4a SPEAKING"**

**200 Run**

**I made sure that all of the text was in CAPS except for the "a" at the end of "99/4a"**. I then saved it and ran it on the 99/4, since the /4 could only read UPPER case letters it said "This is the 99/4 speaking" leaving the "a" out. But this must first be done on a 99/4A so you can put a lower case "a" in the message. This is just a little neat way of knowing if your computer is a 99/4 or 99/4A without looking at the case.

As we know, the 99/4A only has 2 options with a cartridge plugged in. But on a 99/4, there are 3 options, this is because there was an **Equation Calculator built into the 99/4 that could do all of your calculating needs**. In this program, not only could you do calculations, but by pressing "Shift-E" you could store a number or problem in



memory for later use. The Equation Calculator might be the reason why the TI-99/4's ROM is 5 Kbytes larger than a 99/4A. Now for the most important difference.

**The TI-99/4 had the same CPU as the 99/4A** (TMS9900 while running at 3.3MHz) but they had different graphic chips. The

99/4 used the TMS9918 graphics chip and the 99/4A used the **TMS9918A (This might be the reason they called it the 99/4A)**. You might think that by using a 99/4A you could get better graphic capabilities in BASIC. But that is not necessarily true since you could not use the additional display mode (A) in BASIC. I have continuously tried to get Parsec working on my 99/4 (works on my 99/4A) but have had no luck. The reason for this might be that Parsec took advantage of the



TMS9918A capabilities making it not playable on a TMS9918 machine. When the TI-99/4 came out, it was **supplied with an 1/8" mono earphone jack** which could be found on the bottom left side of the console. When you plug in any type of earphones you can get the sound directly from the machine instead of from speakers

(The earphone jack also **appeared on the Apple II computers**). But you should always be careful, once I plugged in my earphones and the computer gave off an ear-piercing sound when I turned it on that rattled my head for a day. There might even be another version of the 99/4 where there is a speaker built into the case under the cartridge port!

**The 99/4 uses a different power supply than a 99/4A.** Usually, the /4 power supply has a large silver TI logo stamped on the top (not engraved like on a /4A). the bottom of the power supply should say this:

I am telling you the differences because if you use a 99/4 power supply on a /4A, you might damage the machine.

You may think that the cartridge ports are the same on both machines, well that isn't true. **The 99/4's cartridge port is 1/4 inch closer to the opening than on a /4A.** This really shouldn't matter unless you have a cartridge titled "**Preschool Early Learning Fun**" (which is totally different than Early Learning Fun) that was made specifically for the 99/4 and if inserted into a 99/4A will not make contact, therefore you will not be able to play the game!==(this photo from [Obsolete Technology Website](#))



*Other facts from a 1979 issue of Mechanix Illustrated Magazine:* **The price of the 99/4 in 1980 was \$1150** ALSO Milton Bradley teams up with TI to make Yahtzee, Connect Four, and Zero Zap for the 99/4 as their first Home Computer games (Excluding Microvision since it was not a Home Computer). And the original 99/4 Speech Synthesizer listed for \$150. Thanks to **Jim Fetzner** for information regarding the cartridge port



## SWITCHABLE FLOPPY DISK DRIVES ----- May 2014

### THE 40 – 80 TRACK THEORY

Before we begin to explain about the switchable floppy disk DRIVE we must first take a look at the floppy DISK and its




terminology. By knowing the number of tracks on a

Disk and how many sectors per track there are we can calculate the storage capacity on each side of a disk and hence the total capacity of a disk e.g. In a single density there are 9 sectors per track with 256 bytes per sector

a total track storage space of 2,304 bytes, with 40 individual tracks the storage area on one side of the disk would be 92,160 bytes and for an 80 track disk 185,320 bytes. If you have double sided drives the respective side capacity is doubled. For ease a disk drives capacity is quoted to the nearest 90 kilo bytes e.g. A 40 track single sided drive stores 90k and 80 track single sided drive stores 180k and so on.

### FORMAT AND DENSITY

Before a brand new diskette can be used by the computer it has to be formatted. This is a process which segments each of the tracks into a number of sectors. A sector is likened to a box which is capable of holding 256 bytes of information. The amount of sectors



placed on a single track can vary. However, 10 sectors are the limit. The TI994a, ATARI, and BBC micro's use a formatting technique known as FM or frequency modulation better known as single density. A maximum of ten 256 byte sectors can be created on a single track using the single

density FM format. Double density is

another type of format which uses modified frequency modulation or MFM. This has the effect of doubling the bit density on the disk and so allowing a twofold increase in the number of sectors per track. Double density should in no way be confused with the number of tracks. Technically it is a method used when formatting, either FM for single density or MFM for double density.

### **INDEX HOLE**

This is the small hole in the jacket of the disk which when optically aligned with a further hole in the disk itself will produce a short pulse, this is referred to as the soft sector index and used by the computer to time a single revolution of the disk.

### **DATA WINDOW.**

This is an elongated hole in the disk jacket which allows the read write head to make contact with the disk. The window appears on both sides of the disk as 40 or 80 track drives can have double heads for recording on both sides of the disk.

### **WRITE ENABLE NOTCH.**

This small notch on one side of the disk (on both sides of a 994a floppy 5 1/4" disk only) is used to enable the disk drives writing electronics, covering it with a small opaque write protect tab will prevent the disk drive from writing data to the disk. Useful for preventing accidental erasure of valuable programs and utilities.


### **HUB RING.**

This exposed portion of disk is mechanically clamped in the disk drives clutch and drive spins at 300 RPM (Revolutions per Minute). The clutch engages as the disk drive door is closed.


### **FLOPPY DRIVES.**

The switchable disk drive is a machine that is capable of reading disks created on either a 40 Track drive or an 80 Track drive. **THIS** drive is in essence an 80 track disk drive with some clever electronics Incorporated that allow the user to choose the track pitch he desires. This choice is made by the setting of a switch easily found on the unit. The 40 Track drive has a pitch of 48 TPI and the 80 Track drive has a pitch of 96TPI (*Tracks Per Inch*).

When the computer sends a step pulse the drive head moves one track, either in towards the centre of the disk or out away from the centre. It would normally take 80 step pulses to move the drive head across the complete range of tracks. However, when the drive is set in the 40 track mode the electronic device adds a second pulse to every one received from the computer. The computer only needs to Issue 40 pulses to move the head all



the way across the



to

disk. This does however present a small problem. The width of the head in an 80 track drive is smaller than the head in a 40 track drive, so when the switchable drive reads a track created on a 40 track machine it only reads half the full track width. This it does with ease the problem occurs when you attempt to write to a disk in the 40 track mode since the head width is smaller, data is only written to half of the correct track width. The switchable drive will read this data without fail. However, if the disk were to be placed in a real 40 track drive the drive would attempt to read half the old data plus half the new data. Ultimately this

ends with an error message typically DISK ERROR AT XX/YY which means data not found at the indicated track and sector. See fig.1 for a clearer understanding. The only suggestion I can make for users wishing to write 40 tracks on such a drive as this.

- (a) The disk used is brand new or previously used disk that has been bulk erased.
- (b) The disk is formatted on a switchable drive set in the 40 track mode.

If these simple steps are adhered to there should be no problem, remember as soon as the written to in a 40 track will be a switchable drive can cause a problem




Fig. 13.1. Showing the overlap from 40 track to 80 track drive.


disk is track drive the width of the increased and so rewriting again with The Golden Rule is this: - When exchanging disks with friends or colleagues remind them to make a BACK UP copy, then any modifications they make can be made on the copied disk without the fear of read write errors

If you abide by the same Work

principle then the rule will both ways.

NOTE: If a disk becomes corrupt, copy the files that are readable and then reformat the disk. If you always keep a backup you will be one step ahead of the accident.

As you can see, in the (new data) diagram above, If an 80 track head writes to an original 40 track disk, 'Old Data' is written over by 'New Data' in half the track width, leaving data that will be read by a switchable drive but not by the original 40 track machine.



**3 1/2" FLOPPY DISK DRIVES**

With 3 1/2" inch floppy drives the number of tracks per inch has increased. This is the reason for

the quieter performance and speedier access times. Track pitch for a 40 track drive is 67.5 TPI; track pitch for the 80 track drive is again double at 135 TPI. A switchable version of the drive is also available.


The 3 1/2" inch drive is completely compatible with the BBC SA400, and ATARI bus compatible with the 5 1/4" inch drive. It can therefore take the place of existing 5 1/4" inch drives or can be added to existing 5 1/4" inch drive systems.

## *Flip Squares*

Flip Square is a puzzle game in which each puzzle is called a Map. The simplest Maps consist of a square array of squares which are either **red** or **gray**. The object is to flip all of the **red squares** to turn them **green**. **Gray** squares cannot be flipped. They simply get in your way and make solving the puzzle harder. You begin by picking one of the **red squares** as your starting point. Then you move to adjacent **red squares** either horizontally or vertically.

**Red squares** in the chosen direction are flipped until you encounter a **gray square**, a **green square** or the edge of the Map. Then you move in a different direction. You will either flip all of the **red squares** (success) or arrive at point where there are remaining **red squares** but with none adjacent to your current position (fail).

### **Orange squares**


Orange squares must be passed through twice. The first pass changes the square to a **red square** and the second pass **changes it to green**.

### **Purple squares**



When you encounter a **purple square** it changes to **green** but also jumps you over the next square in the direction you are moving providing that you land on a square that can be **flipped (red)**.



You cannot jump over the **gray square** because there is not a **red square** on the other side.


## OVERVIEW

differences.


