Chicago Faire Report

The following is a condensation of a report on the Chicago TI Faire. The original article was written by Gary W. Cox and appears in the November issue of MICROpendium.

The Chicago Faire was labeled as a big success. Vendors reported sales as brisk. The hottest piece of software introduced was "Sound F/X" by Berry Boone. This is a program that allows the TI to play true digital sound through a TI-99/4A or Geneve without additional equipment. (Hopefully we will have a demo of this at the December meeting.)

Other goodies included 10 new games from Texaments that have been ported over from the Tomy Tutor Computer exclusively for use on the 9640.

Bud Mills featured the TIM converter which takes RGB analog signals and converts them to composite allowing the use of a composite monitor or TV set with the TIM 80 column device.

The Accelerator card for the TI was not available. It was listed as "still in the works." OPA showed a digital sound adaptor which connects to the parallel port allowing the user to play back 8 bit digital sound. Also new from OPA is a POP cart, a device containing a set of user-selected TI-99 modules/programs all in one cartridge the plugs into the module port. The user selects the carts he wants and all are "burned" into one cartridge that is then accessed through an on screen menu. The basic unit containing 256K can hold from 5 to 7 cartridges. Units with up to 2 meg are available.

Berry Miller representing 9640 News displayed a variety of products including GEME, a software package that allows multiple windows to be used on the 9640. Also available from Berry is GenTRI, a telecommunications, disk manager and wordprocessor all in one package.

Notung Software showed several new items including Bride of Disk of Dinosaurs, Fonts and Borders and Disk of Horrors including TI Artist art files, music and animation plus three original horror short stories by Ken Gilliland.

Harrison Software presented two new games: Scud Buster and Code Breaker.

There were several other dealers offering

THE ORGANIZER
For TI Base

Reviewed by Mike Marfisi

The Organizer by Bill Gaskill is billed as "an information management system designed for those who don't have the time or inclination to learn database management software." It stores information electronically just as you would store it manually in a filling cabinet. Each "cabinet" consists of four drawers, labeled A, B, C and D. Within each drawer are "folders" that are used to

store information that you wish to file. Each folder contains a Subject (the folder name) that is used to identify the folder, and six text lines to store any information you desire. The number of folders that can be stored in each drawer is limited only by your disk space, or up to the 16,129 record capacity of TI Base.

The Organizer offers a completely menu driven environment that permits any function to be accessed with a single letter or number entry followed by the <Enter> key. The system contains three menus: a System Menu which displays the cabinet and drawer names, an Options Menu which is used to perform utility type functions on the folder data, and a Drawer Menu, which lists the data manipulation options that are available for each drawer.

The program is designed to work as part of TI BASE. So one begins by loading TI BASE and then placing The Organizer into the DATDISK drive. At the dot prompt type "DO MENU" and <Enter>. The program will load, a title screen will appear, the drawers will be unlocked (the files will be opened) and the System menu will be displayed. You are now ready to go.

The names used for the filing cabinet and the drawers can be changed to suit your needs. The defaults are Drawer A, B, C & D. Change them to whatever you want.

You are now ready to enter data. You may choose to type data by using either a custom designed entry screen or the traditional TI BASE Append screen. Either works the

same, they just look a little different. After making your screen selection the data entry screen appears. This screen consists of line 1 which is the folder subject followed by 6 lines of text. First give the folder a title then enter whatever info you wish on the 6 text lines. The program will automatically sort the folders on the first or Subject line. If you make an entry error or want to change info in the current record you may do so.

At a later date, if you wish to change data, you may do so by selecting the Change option from the Drawer Menu. Type the first 10 letters of the folder name (the subject data entered for a folder) to locate the record to be changed. Then simply type over any data to be changed.

Anytime you wish to find data that has been entered you choose the Find option from the Drawer Menu. To use this option you must know the exact name you gave to the folder. You can get a complete list of folders anytime by using the List option.

Select F from the Drawer Menu. Type the first 10 letters of the name of the folder you want to find and the data will appear on the screen.

You may print the data from a file by selecting the P option from the Drawer Menu. The data will be printed to your printer rather than the screen.

The Options Menu allow you to activate a file or "open a drawer," delete a folder, list data (show all data in a drawer in alpha order), print a report (same as list accept data goes to printer), remove deletions and sort a drawer.

That is really all there is to it. As I said at the top, this utility is designed for those who need very basic data storage capabilities and don't want to learn all of the ins and outs of TI BASE. It does the job nicely. For the owner of TI BASE this utility is a good way to get started using the program while learning more about TI BASE itself. By studying the make-up and command files of the Organizer the user gets a great insight into how TI BASE works. You can do a lot mot with the utility after you learn more about TI BASE.

I would recommend this utility to those who 1) already own TI BASE and haven't been able to "crack" it yet but want to use its basic functions or 2) those who wish to purchase TI BASE and learn to use it but need to get started creating usable data bases right now. I would not recommend it to the person who just needs a basic data base to keep track of names and addresses. There are many other good simple DB programs for this type of person.

The Organizer sells for \$14.95 and is available from Texaments. Remember, to use it you must also own TI BASE ver 2.0 of higher.
