MINUTES

VAST Computer User Group March 14, 1992

The March 14, 1992 meeting of *VAST* was officially called to order by President Jim Ely at 10:00 a.m. The proceedings were attended by 26 people, including all officers and 5 new members. After an introduction of everyone present, a motion was passed to accept the minutes as published in the newsletter. Following the vote, the treasury report was read and accepted. Jim Ely then asked for the *COMMITTEE REPORTS*.

LIBRARY: Wallace and Hazel Knight reported that all of Virginia Davis' clip art program disks have been added to the library following the recent Fest-West. Also they reminded members that the club has videos that can be checked out. They cover a wide range of subjects and are very educational.

BBS: Jim mentioned that the Fest-West conference would be no longer needed now that the event has passed. He would like to have new ideas for future conferences to replace it. Do you have any ideas? BBSers were also reminded to kill old messages after their purpose has been served. Members were also reminded that the club has a couple of "loaner modems" for those that would like to try them.

PUBLICITY: Tom Pfeffer announced that he was resigning his post as publicity chairman due to his long work hours. Ray Frantz volunteered to take over the position. Thank you Ray. Tom mentioned that he had sent out a letter to some potential members along with the latest newsletter.

PROGRAM: Bud listed the next couple of months topics and asked for ideas from members as to what they would like to see. Ralph Rees is up in April on John Birdwell's "Disk Utilities". Jim Ely will demo "Telco" in May. Wallace Knight did a demo of "TI Artist" after this month's business meeting.

FEST-WEST: Ralph and Hazel presented the final committee report for Fest-West '92. Hazel began with an impressive financial report. She stated that final bills and gifts will be paid and that the account will be closed. She reported that several vendors had sent letters of thanks and that the Days Inn invited us back should we ever need another hotel facility. The group voted to give David Marfisi a gift for his security work at the FEST. Hazel also reported that she hadn't heard anything from the SW 99ers about the videotape of the FEST.

Jim Ely made a short speech and presented certificates of award to Ralph Rees, Hazel Knight, Gene Gibson and Ed Morse for their hard work and dedication for the FEST.

NEWSLETTER: Jim encouraged everyone to submit articles for upcoming editions of the newsletter.

After the committee reports, Jim opened the floor to *OLD BUSINESS*. The BBS upgrade was the first topic that came up and after a discussion of various options, Jim was given the authorization by unanimous vote to spend up to \$200 dollars to purchase the necessary components to bring the BBS up to speed.

Jack Workman reminded the group that we still need a monitor for the club system. The solution was made easy when Chris Taylor made the group an offer that was hard to resist. The vote was unanimous to buy the monitor from Chris.

Bud Barnes made a motion that the club make a donation in the name of *VAST* to the Pyle Adult Community Center for allowing us the use of the facilities. It was mentioned that the group had never given Pyle any money and that a donation would be a good way to show our appreciation. The motion was seconded and the vote was unanimous to send Pyle a check for the amount of \$100.

Next on the agenda was NEW BUSINESS. Gene Gibson told everyone of an idea to raise money by holding a monthly raffle after the business meeting. He mentioned that a user group in San Diego made \$2100 running a similar raffle. After discussing several different ideas, the club decided to give it a try. Gene volunteered to run the event.

Ralph Rees volunteered to put together a "Game Disk of the Month" for each month's meeting. Unfortunately, the club

was out of blank disks, but the idea was met with enthusiasm. Also, the club decided to place an order for more blank disks.

The topic of a pizza party to celebrate the success of the *FEST-WEST* was discussed and was agreed upon by all. After a short discussion about anchovies, Bud Barnes volunteered to take care of all of the details of the event.

Chris Taylor spoke of the vendor forum at the *FEST* and mentioned that some new standards were proposed for upcoming hardware and software releases. He thought that it would be a good idea for VAST to support these new standards and after a clarification of those standards, the group voted unanimously to endorse them. Chris also volunteered to represent VAST at the Lima Ohio fair this spring.

Up next was a discussion of the possibilities of handing out the newsletters at the meetings versus mailing them. It was mentioned that only five members were not at the meeting and that the club had saved a bunch of stamps in the process. By unanimous vote, the club opted to mail newsletters only to those not present at our monthly meetings. Chris Taylor also voiced an idea for a monthly article and volunteered to write it too.

Bud reminded all members that a group of VAST members have breakfast together at the Denny's down the street before our monthly meetings. All are invited. We usually start to show up around 8:00. The restaurant is located at Rural Road and the

Catalog Available

Software and More has published a catalog of the company's. TI99/4A software.

Selling for \$10 plus \$1 shipping each are Grafiks and Music v2.2, which has various framed graphics pictures and songs, for which the words appear on screen as the songs play; Musical Christmas Tree in which the lights on the Christmas tree in the onscreen Christmas scene flash different colors as Christmas songs play; List of Labels Labeler, written for a Star Gemini 10X type printer, said to print out a list of labels with a "Thumbs Up!" graphic on the left side; and Valentine Card, which pictures a big heart in the center of the screen surrounded by a moving border of heart-shaped characters to the music of "I Left My Heart in San Francisco."

Fairware items available for a \$1 copying charge plus \$1 shipping are Telephone Dialer, a telephone number directory which is said to dial the number from the directory if the user puts the telephone mouthpiece by the monitor's speaker, and Flags and Map, which has pictures of various flags, including the Olympic flag and a map of the 48 connected United States.

Non-Profit Organizations Benefit from Tex-Comp

Tex-Comp will donate TI books to nonprofit organizations which will use them in their programs and which will pay shipping or arrange to pick the books up at Tex-Comp's warehouse, says Jerry Price of Tex-Comp.

He says to receive the books, the facility should send a letter stating that it is a charity or non-profit organization, and that it wants the books for internal use, not for resale as a fundraiser and not for door prizes.

He says that Tex-Comp has contributed books and equipment to Eunice Spooner's student group at the Atwood-Tapley School; Marion Hall (Sister Pat Taylor): the St. Anthony Mission and the Special Awareness Center "and now we're looking for more."

OLD TRICKS

FOR NEW (and not so new) USERS

Though many of us tend to ignore most of the cartridge software for our computer, with the exception of TI Extended BASIC and, possibly, MultiPlan, LOGO II, Editor/Assembler, and TE-II (for speech), many of the cartridges are very enjoyable. In order to give you an excuse for searching your closets and basements looking for those hidden modules, I'd like to point out that many of them have undocumented features ranging from useful to interesting to amusing. Here are a few examples...

Many are probably familiar with "the Secret of Personal Record Keeping: implementing DISPLAY AT and ACCEPT AT without Extended BASIC," published way back in 99'er Magazine and reprinted in the Best of 99'er, page 76. Briefly, TI BASIC, with the PRK module installed, contains the commands CALL D() and CALL A() (similiar to DISPLAY AT and ACCEPT AT). Presumably this also works with the Statistics module, but I do not have this one and could not verify it. I have been told that this is a result of the hybrid nature of certain modules containing both GPL and BASIC coding. Perhaps someone knows or could discover additional undocumented features of this cartridge (I have extra PRK modules if anybody would like to experiment), and possible other cartridges which call console BASIC routines (e.g. Tax/Investment Record Keeping).

Next, the TI Disk Manager cartridge offers a proprietary protection feature that does not allow the Disk Manager to copy a protected diskette. To use it, press the FCTN-X key 10 times while on any menu screen. You will hear a beep (if your monitor has sound!) and will appear at the center top of the screen. Any diskettes initialized at this point will be proprietary protected. Each time you address them using the Disk Manager cartridge (e.g. to catalog such a diskette), a low-tone beep will sound (not present for unprotected diskettes), informing you that the diskette is protected. The protection information is stored in sector 0 on the diskette. This type of protection is ineffective against the sector disk copiers and has been discussed in the past. I wonder if anybody knows more about it. The DM-1000 offers protection and unprotection of diskettes; is it the same kind as the TI Disk Manager cartridge?

Now to a few game cartridges...

Moonmine, Alpiner, Munchman, Munchmobile and Hopper have a test mode where you can select the starting level. So if you wanted to see what it is like to play at those levels you could never reach, here is a good reason to plug those cartridges into you 99/4A! The test mode is obtained by pressing SHIFT/8 3 8 at the game title screen (SHIFT/8 only for Hopper). And on Burgertime, pressing SHIFT/8 gives a message: "code modifications by John M. Phillips."

Have you always played Parsec as a one player game? Here is something different,

TI-WRITER TIP

Form Letters. Part II

As you may recall, in last month's newsletter Ray Frantz gave us some insite into one of TI-Writers lesser used funtions, the Form Letter option. This month we will set up a small mailing list and write a form letter to utilize the mailing list.

This article is by Chick De Marti from the LA 99ers TopIcs Newsletter.

WHAT IS A MAIL MERGE?

A Mail Merge is a convenient way to mail a form letter to many people without manually typing in the names, addresses, etc. This is extremely useful when various forms of communication must be sent to the same group of people monthly, quarterly, etc. So the obvious thing then would be to create a mailing list. Use this example...

(Press <ENTER> after each line. Yes! the numbers 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6 must be entered. Notice the '*' asterick separating each group of numbers. TI-Writer recognizes it as a separator.)

Save this file as DSKn.MYFILE-1 (n=the drive number of the drive you save your data on.)

Next, let's create a form-letter. This is the one I created for our August meeting. A typical heading would look like this... (Continued →)

(Save the letter as DSKn.FORMLET-1)

This is about as simple as it can be. By doing the mailing list in the TI-Writer editor, you can make changes, corrections, as well as additions with little or no trouble.

NOTE: When you are through typing your form letter, before leaving the editor, make a quick copy of it using the PF command (Print-File). The resulting copy will include all 'dot' commands and will allow you to check the finished copy with the original notes.

To make a 'Print-File' copy, while still in the editor:

press FCTN-9 to get to the command line,

type PF <enter>

PIO (no! LF (line feed) is not needed)

You may be using BA-etc., etc. In any case just press <enter> and a copy of your form letter will be printed.

PRINTING THE LETTERS

This is even easier. Get into the Formatter and follow the prompts:

That's all there is to it. When the letters are printed, TI-Writer will replace *1* *2* *3* with Mr. Tom Jones and the *4* with his address. *5* will be replaced by the City, State, etc. and at *6* will insert "Jones family". Neat, huh?

Now TI-Writer has another feature you might like to try. It is a manual insert option. Using this option you could insert personal information anywhere within the letter. This could be used by a business for billing purposes, or for a club to make it's members aware of changes, awards, etc. Here's a quick 'how to'.

Let's make a minor change to our mailing list. Load MYFILE-1 into your editor and then delete all line sixes (Jones family, etc.). Place the cursor on the '6' and press FCTN-3. When finished: Save as DSKn.MYFILE-2

Now load your FORMLET-1

Normally, this would probably be a different heading, but for the sake of expediency, let's use what we have. Go to the line with Dear *2*, and change it to Dear *1* *3* (Mr. Jones). Now to the letter itself. Type in:

Thank you for your recent payment. Your balance is *6*. If you have any questions, please give my office a call. See WRITER TIP on page 11

.IN +32 Yours truly, Ida Dungood SMALL LOAN CO.

Again using the FCTN-3 key, delete the rest of the letter and save it as DSKn.FORMLET-2 (Did you make a copy using PF?)

TI-Writer matches all numbers within the asterisks (*1* *2*, etc.) with the respective lines in the mailing list. If it does not find the corresponding number, it halts the printing and asks for your input.

Now print your letters answering the prompts as you did for FORMLET-1. the printer will stop and at the message "Enter input:" enter a dollar sign and any amount you want... Example: \$1150.90. When you read the letter, the second sentence will now read:

"Your balance is \$1150.90."

There doesn't seem to be any limit to the number of inputs you may have. With that in mind, another opportunity to use the Mail Merge might be at Golf touraments. Still using the mailing list MYFILE-2, type in this form-letter:

Dear *2*,

Thank you for participating in the Junior/Senior Golf Tourney. Your official handicapped score was *6* earning you *7* as your portion of the 'Winner's Booty'. Looking forward to seeing you next year.

.IN+32 Bobby Sox, tres. Good Guys Golf Gang

The inputs in the above example are obvious, and as you can see, the occasions to use a Mail Merge are endless. So try it out for kicks... I did and I learned how to Mail Merge.


Next month Jim Ely will do a demo on using and configuring *TELCO* for BBS users. Those even remotely interested in using the BBS should attend.
