This concluded the reports. Next came *OLD BUSINESS*. There being no old business, the subject of *NEW BUSINESS* was introduced.

Ray Frantz introduced a motion to limit the "swap meet" atmosphere during the social hour between 9 and 10 a.m. He also proposed that VAST have a swap meet every 3 months instead. After a long discussion of pros and cons, the motion was defeated by a vote of 4 for, and 9 against. Members were encouraged to make more use of the BBS and newsletter for selling used equipment.

Mike Marfisi brought in the club disks that were ordered after the last meeting. Members can purchase disks from the club, but no firm price was ever given. There being no further new business, Jim Ely closed the meeting at 11:00 so that a demo could be given and Bud Barnes could pick up the pizzas. Unfortunately, no one had a monitor cable to use on the club system, but the pizza was good.

Efforts underway to Purchase Myarc's MDOS

Beery Miller, publisher of 9640 News, has begun coordination of an effort to purchase rights to the MDOS source code from Lou Phillips of Myarc and Paul Charlton, author of the code.

Miller says he began the project because Myarc has officially released no version of MDOS for more than two years, and the versions released, 1.14F and 0.97H, have several, "if not many" bugs which require programming around and patches to function with other programs.

Miller says cost discussed nearly a year ago with Charlton for MDOS was \$10,000, too large a sum for any individual to pursue. However, Miller has received pledges of donations to aid in purchase of MDOS ranging from \$25 to \$250 for the purchase, and he says he is donating \$100 plus time for acquisitions and negotiations.

Lou Phillips informed Miller that "He felt things would work out if the money was raised on his (Miller's) end and felt the price tag may be less than originally estimated. How much less, he didn't know."

Miller says he plans to coordinate development of the source code with several programmers, and will also supply copies of the source code to persons contributing to its purchase, if they send in diskettes and postage paid mailers. Although he forsees unofficial releases of MDOS versions by different individuals, Miller hopes to coordinate official releases by the development group.

Contributors should send a check, along with a self addressed stamped envelope, to Beery Miller/9640 News, P.O. Box 752465, Memphis, TN 38175-2465.

Miller says contributions will be deposited into a special separate account. Interest will be applied to his telephone and travel expenses in connection with the project. Once MDOS has been purchased, "numbers will be crunched tallying people's contributions and returning unspent money if contributions exceed purchase price and expenses," Miller says.

New Catalog Available From OPA

OPA (Oasis Pensive Abucators) has released its 1992 spring catalog on disk. The catalog comes on a sssd disk and is in D/V80 format. The catalog is available in a hard copy format by request.

OPA also confirms that it has ended its development role in the TI Accelerator project.

TI Presence Unlikely At Next TICOFF

It's not likely that any TI vendors will be at next year's TICOFF, if it is held. Over the past several years the fair has expanded to include PCs, and apparently there's precious little left for TIers. My understanding is that it wasn't a big success for anyone, which is unfortunate. TICOFF has been around for a long time and has seen better days. At any rate, there were only two TI vendors on site, so it had to be disappointing for any TI users who attended.

TI Conference Setup On BIX

An active TI conference covering the TI99/4A and the Myarc Geneve 9640 is available on BYTE Information Exchange, an electronic conferencing system created by BYTE Magazine. Moderator is Ron Lepine and co-moderator is Al Beard.

BIX offers a fixed price of \$156 per year in network charges (billed quarterly). Telecommunications (e.g., TYMNET charges) are extra.

To join BIX, dial with your computer software set to 7-bit, even parity, 1 stop bit. full duplex: 1-800-225-4129 (in Massachusetts, call (617) 861-9767), then log in:

Off-peak access to TYMNET is available at a fixed price of \$20 per month or \$3 per hour, Beard said.

In Other News...

The Nihon Keizai Shimbun, a leading Japanese business newspaper, has reported that computer makers IBM and Apple Computer are talking with Japan's Toshiba Corp. about jointly developing multimedia Computers. The companies were likely to reach agreement by the end of May on a wideranging plan to develop, manufacture and sell multimedia equipment, the report said. Multimedia computers can combine computer functions with television images and sound.

I have had some problems with some of my hardware and thought I'd run it by some of my fellow TI'ers and see if they have an answer. If any other TI'ers from other states have the answer to these questions PLEASE contact me via our group newsletter address.

O Using PLATO with a Corcomp disk controller. The problem is you CAN'T! I have verified this with Mike Grogan and he stated that his system (also equipped with the Corcomp controller) will not read PLATO diskettes either.

With the PLATO cartridge in place and a PLATO diskette in drive 1, the system will read the diskette and then state "I/O ERROR - PRESS ENTER TO CONTINUE." The only problem is, pressing enter does no good as at this point the system is locked and the only way out is shut down. Anybody out there got any clues?

② 1200 baud modem usage with a Corcomp RS232 card. My pal Wallace Knight was having a bad time getting a 1200 baud modem to function with his system. So me being the confident hardware junkie that I am said "No problem Wallace, We'll get you fixed up in a jiffy! It must be a dipswitch problem or something REAL simple!" Right! WRONG! After a couple 2-3 trips over to the Knights and wracking my feeble brain out, I had remembered that a Corcomp RS232 can on occassion do some weird things, so I asked Wallace if he had a TI RS232. He did, we installed it, and the 1200 baud modem worked fine!

Now mind you, a 300 baud modem worked fine with the Corcomp, but plug in a 1200 baud and NO GO! Now check this out... I am building a portable TI of sorts using a Corcomp M.E.S. and SAME PROBLEM! I use a 300 baud modem with nary a hitch but connect a 1200 baud and NO GO again! Does anyone have an answer for me on this!?

- Neeping the MYARC 512 energized. I have really been having a problem with my Myarc Ramdisk. I am presently using as backup power a 9 volt ATARI power converter that supplies OVER 1 amp and the Myarc card STILL glitches after I power down. Does anyone out there know of a RELIABLE way to backup power to this card so the files will be there for you?
- Mechatronics GRAM-KARTE. I own one of these cards and do not use it very much because it has no means of power back-up. I was told at one time that there is a way to wire it to a transformer to keep the card alive after system shut down but have never found it. Does anyone have this info?


