

CALL JUNCTION

Hello fellow 99'ers? I would like to share another short call program, "CALL JUNCTION", that has been very useful to me. It allows the branching of a program in as many directions as desired and the choice of a direction with a single key stroke.

100 SUB JNC(T\$,K\$,X)?~~~CALL JUNCTION~~~

CALL JUNCTION works in conjunction with an "ON GOTO" or an "ON GOSUB" or a combination of the two. I.E.:

18 CALL JNC("(Y)es or (N)o", "YyNn", X)

11 ON X GOTO 20,30

20 PRINT "YES" :: GOTO 10

30 PRINT "NO" :: GOTO 10

PARAMETERS

The first parameter (T\$) is text to be displayed to give instructions to the user. It can be optional or changed to suit one's needs.

The second parameter (K\$) contains the pairs of characters who's corresponding keys will be active. Any key (CTRL, FCTN, SHIFT) can be activated. Any number of keys can be activated. The characters are given in pairs, with no space or separators between them. Both characters in the pair perform the same function. This makes it easy to assign both upper and lower case to the same function. If only one key is wanted for one function the same character is given both times in the pair. Since the enter key cannot be typed and often needs to be active, the power symbol "^" is substituted for the CHR\$(13), (SEE LINE 130) so that the power symbol activates the enter key.

The third parameter (X) is returned to the main program to drive the "ON GOTO" or "ON GOSUB".

HOW IT WORKS

(Line 18) calls JNC. (Line 118) displays T\$ centered on row 24. (Line 128) calls key and idles until a key is pressed. If a key is pressed (Line 138) tests for the power symbol. (Line 148) searches K\$ to match the key pressed. If no match is made then a sound is called and back to (Line 128). If a match is made X becomes equal to the position of the match. (Line 158) tests X to see if it is odd. If X is odd, 1 is added to X (this gives the first character in the pair the same value as the second). (Line 168) reorders the positions of the pairs in one integer increments. (Line 178) subends with X. If X=1 then (Line 11) goes to (Line 28) and prints "YES", or if X=2 (Line 11) goes to (Line 38) and prints "NO", then back to (Line 18).

I have found that with the use of this call program, I can design programs that are driven by many small menus, rather than one or two big main menus. This gives the program a better flow and allows one more choices and escapes.

I hope this is useful and would welcome any feed back.

HOW TO RUN R DESO PROGRAM WITHOUT THE "RUN" NAME

Load II-BASIC from EDITOR/ASSEMBLER or MINI-MEMORY. TYPE:

CALL INIT
CALL LOAD("DSK?.filename")
CALL PEEK(16176, A, B, C, D, E, F)
PRINT CHA\$(A)&CHA\$(B)&CHA\$(C)&CHA\$(D)&CHA\$(E)&CHA\$(F)

The program name will now be printed and if you wish, CALL LINK("program")

CREATE YOUR OWN CURSOR

I don't quite know how to give proper credit to this routine, but whoever discovered this way to modify the cursor is an unsung hero.

While I have experimented with II Extended Basic, I have learned many ways to make it do the things about which the manual never told you. Also, I have learned not to forget the clever programmers who offered their information and discoveries to the II community.

Creating a cursor is rather easy, and once done, the cursor routine can always be used in other programs. If you understand how to define a character then understanding how to create a cursor is just as easy.

First, here is the XB code to redefine the cursor:

100 CALL CLEAR :: CALL INIT

110 CALL LOAD(8196,63,248)

120 CALL LORD(16376,67,85,82,83,79,82,48,8)

130 CALL LOAD(12288,255,129,129,129,129,129,129,255)

140 CALL LORD(12296,2,0,3,240,2,1,48,0,2,2,0,8,4,32,32,36,4,91)

150 CALL LINK("CURSOR")

Line 130 defines the cursor description (what it looks — like). Defining the cursor is made rather easy because you are not using HEX but decimal.

As you can see, the values come from adding the total value across each row to define the segments in the cursor. (Note the X's in the figure and the weighted value that was totaled.)

After defining your custom cursor, save it to disk and you are ready for your first run.

Run your program and look at your cursor. If you don't like it, merely make some changes and run again. Repeat this process until you are satisfied with your new cursor.

Note: The new cursor will stay in effect until you turn off your console.

to use a computer that's almost 15 years old? For the same reasons that we used them when they were new. You turn it on, pop in a cartridge or disk and are off and running. Never failed to do so. What the TI-99/4A does it does well. No it won't run windows or bloated poorly written applications. No self respecting computer would.

What I am trying to say is that we need a way to get the two groups together. You and other support groups can keep the hardware and software developments coming, and the rest of us can buy tickets to watch the game.

You probably noticed the sloppily hand written address on the envelope. This was to ensure that it is not machine readable. This letter was sorted, along with eleven others at the same time, to one of two hundred and seventy-seven sort bins. Every second twelve more are sorted the same way. These large machines (over seventy feet long) are controlled by a TI 9900 processor with 32K of RAM. Not Bad!
