# On Freeware

The Freeware section is a very interesting feature of your magazine, and as a Systems Programmer who deals with software packages for IBM 4300 computers I have found that the free (or almost so) software provided by user groups are included in later revisions of a product as enhancements, which is something micro software developers don't provide. As the old adage about computer development goes: "If you can buy it, it is obsolete," and if you think this is false, ask an IBM sales rep what goodies have been announced but delivery date is four months away.

I have a program called SPRITE BUILDER that I originally wrote (over several months) and sold commercially through a company called CMS. In late December last year CMS folded and rights to the program returned to me. I had been planning to make some major modifications to the program for some time. I spent the next two months adding some assembly language routines to make what I thought was an already good program even better. When I was finished, I found myself caught in a bind. Here was what I felt was a really good program, and I had no way to distribute it. A good friend of mine had been distributing his programs under the Freeware concept. The idea sounded great to me. I didn't have to find someone to sell my program, and the TI community didn't have to buy it in order to be able to get and use it. My goal was not to get rich. (I knew beforehand what kind of return to expect. Only about 18 percent of the requestors ever make any kind of contribution, and that is fine. Under the Freeware concept any return is accepted, nothing is demanded.) Rather, it was to share something in which I had invested a large amount of time, and in which I had a great deal of pride.

I have a confession to make. SPRITE BUILDER was not an original idea. In fact, TI gave away the source to a BASIC Character Definition program with every computer they sold. Just look on page III-26 of the User's Reference Guide. I simply took what I thought was a good but unfinished idea and spiffed it up. Even though it could be called a clone, with all the added features and assembly language speed, I don't consider it to be. I neither have or have ever had any intention of trying to damage the TI market by offering my program as Freeware. Rather, I had thought that I was providing good software in a risk free environment to the TI community. When our computer comes out of its box for the first time, all it is capable of doing is allowing the owner to program. It's hard to believe that anyone would consider using the machine to do what it was designed for as destroying a market.

So according to "Those," I guess I stole someone else's idea and wrote a program that dumps a screen in about 40 seconds at a tab spacing you specify and prints in six different modes. And (gasp) I gave it away. Not just to my friends, but to anyone who wanted it. If this offended the people who were and are selling 30 minute screen dumps for over \$20, then I'm sorry. But my program still is, and will be available FREE! At the time I wrote the screen dump, I had not even heard of Freeware.

system bother "Those"? I think it's because people are tired of paying \$30 and up for programs that are poorly written, and are hard to use. With Freeware, you're sure to get what you pay for, since you have a chance to try before you buy. I'm not saying all Freeware programs are great. Some literally stink. But just because a program author doesn't choose to market his program in the traditional manner doesn't make him any less a programmer. By the same token, writing a program and selling it "commercially" doesn't make one a great programmer. I guess that the major complaint of "Those" is that a lot of Freeware programs are copies of their overpriced software. I'm sure that some are, but most of the Freeware that I've seen have been top quality, either original, or so much better than any other program of its type that it couldn't be counted as a copy. "Those" are going to have to start producing better products at more reasonable prices if they expect to sell software in the TI marketplace. A good example to follow is the EX-PLORER program written by D.C. Warren, and sold by Millers Graphics. It is absolutely the BEST program that I have had the opportunity to use, and the 105 page manual alone is worth the \$25 price. I don't think Freeware will put an end to innovation in the TI market. New products are being released for our computer almost weekly, and things such as Myarc's new 128K memory card and Extended Basic II open up new and exciting possibilities for the programmer. What Freeware might do is assure that new programs are of the utmost quality and available at attractive prices. The true innovators won't stop writing programs... they're too hooked! **Danny Michael**

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Please advise me what I have to do to connect the external drive, or what is the name of the part missing.

You have the proper special cable and adapter board. Assuming the shorter, special cable is correctly connected to the disk controller and the adapter board is correctly inserted into the other end of the special cable, the problem would have to lie in the longer cable that connects to the external drive. It seems that your external drive cable includes a polarity notch, which ours don't. Although both ends of the adapter board are slotted, only the notch on the side that connects into the disk controller cable is necessary. Our external drive cables include three connectors for edge cards (one at either end and another one about one-third way down). The adapter board fits easily into one end (no polarity notch) while the other end fits into the edge connector of an external disk drive. The other connection is for a second external drive. I recommend you obtain another external drive cable without a polarity notch that accomodates 34-position edge connectors. You may also consider carefully cutting out the polarity notch in your external drive cable, though I do not recommend it—Ed.

# **GRAM Kracker to debut**

A forthcoming product from Millers Graphics, the GRAM Kracker, will make it possible for users to save any module-based program to disk or cassette, make modifications, reload it into the unit and make the modifications to the cartridge, according to the manufacturer.

Craig Miller of Millers Graphics says the base unit will include 48K RAM and GRAM, expandable to 80K RAM and GRAM.

"When it is fully expanded, you can also make modifications to TI-BASIC and the operating system in the console," he says. "This means you can change character sets, for instance to where you have a slashed zero and true ascenders and descenders all the time. With a flip of the switch, you can go back to the old one."

It appears that I did not document one feature of Advanced Diagnostics very well since a couple of other people have requested a Quick Reference Card also. Advanced Diagnostics has a built-in Quick Reference Card so you never have to worry about losing it. You can press FCTN 7—AID on any screen and Advanced Diagnostics will window in a HELP section. This section is paged through with the CTRL E and CTRL X keys and it contains a complete alphabetical listing of the full command name, the abbreviation and the syntax for each command. It also lists the valid head step times for the two disk controllers and all of the Function and Control Key assignments. On the Command Screen it displays the commands first and it windows in just above the command line so you can see what you have typed in and are looking for help on. On the Edit Sector or Read Track screens the **HELP** windows in with the Function keys displayed first since there isn't a command line on these screens. When you are done paging through the HELP just press any key other than the page keys and this section will disappear and you will be able to continue right where you were before. **Craig Miller** 

Miller says the GRAM Kracker will also make it possible for TI99/4A users to program in GPL code.

A console and cassette is required "for the bare system," he says. He says the loader built into the unit will load a 56K module in 30 seconds. The system will allow users to make permanent changes to screen and text color, he says.

The GRAM Kracker looks like a long cartridge that extends to the onoff switch (on the beige consoles). It is about the same height as Navarone's Widget. The GRAM Kracker is plugged into the cartridge port and a cartridge is then plugged into a slot. After dumping, the cartridge may be removed.

The cartridge program may be stored in the battery-backed GRAM. In terms of its operation, users may load TI-Writer into the GRAM Kracker, including the editor and formatter files. Then, when used, the user selects the TI-Writer function he wants from the TI-Writer menu and the function is loaded instantly. A manual and a floppy disk containing changes to Extended BASIC will be included with the system, which he expects to ship beginning Nov. 15. He says he estimates the price at between \$150 and \$200. For further information, contact Millers Graphics at 1475 W. Cypress Ave., San Dimas, CA 91773.

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# Taking control of CTRL U

#### **By WILLIAM J. BULLOCK**

As a new user of the TI-Writer wordprocessing program, I was disappointed that I could not easily make use of the many format and special character commands available on my Panasonic KX-P1091 printer. In particular, I wanted to be able to use italic, emphasized, condensed, elongated, continuously underlined, superscript and subscript print. Additionally, I needed to be able to change the type pitch from the standard pica to elite or proportional at will. According to the TI-Writer manual, I could use broken underlining and doublestrike print easily, but that was it. I read in the manual about the possibility of using the transliteration command to access additional printer capabilities, but I was not at all sure how to make effective use of the command. Then I read Ron Castleton's article in the February 1985 issue of MICROpendium. I put his suggestions to use immediately. However, I found that it was difficult to remember which keys I had transliterated to what printer command. The keys had been selected for ease in recognizing the intext symbols they create, rather than for ease in remembering the printer commands assigned to them. I decided to rework Ron's Transliteration Command Set to make use of a mnemonic aid for actually typing the commands into the text.

use a keyboard character that I had previously transliterated into a printer command. I also felt it inconsistent that some printer commands had to be preceded by the CTRL U command and others did not. By activating all printer commands from the computer's "special character" mode (i.e., the CTRL U command) consistency was achieved and all existing keyboard characters were left intact. Incidentally, an additional advantage of this procedure became apparent later, when I needed to access a printer command that I had not previously set

of the actual process I followed in setting up my Transliteration File, so let's get down to specifics.

When I use the keyboard to enter a document, I consider that three kinds of characters are available to me. First, of course, are the characters printed on the tops of the keys. These are generated by simply pressing the key or by pressing SHIFT while pressing the key. Nothing new about that. Second, are the characters available by pressing the FCTN key plus a key with a character printed on its front. Nothing new about that either. The new concept comes from regarding the CTRL key as the doorway to yet a third set of : characters, namely those that access specific printer commands. So you want to print in italic type, or condensed type? Or you want to underline a passage with one continuous line?

3. To the extent possible, I would select keystrokes that were easy to associate with the printer command they activated.

The first guideline was decided upon because I had found myself wanting to

up. I simply transliterated one of the unused keyboard characters (e.g., the backslash or the tilde) into the printer command I needed just for that one document.

Then press the CTRL key (CTRL U to be precise) and open up a whole new world of printer commands.

By way of background, TI-Writer uses CTRL U as the means of entering the so-called "special character" mode (see page 98 of the TI-Writer manual). From this mode (which is signaled on the screen by a cursor that appears as an underline rather than the usual vertical block) you may enter characters that are not available on the keyboard (specifically, those with ASCII codes 0-31, the so-called control codes). Once in this mode (i.e., once having pressed CTRL U) you may press any of the following keys, thereby entering one of the control characters: SHIFT A through Z, SHIFT 2, SHIFT 6, FCTN R, FCTN T, FCTN U and FCTN Z, a total of 32 keys (see page 146 of the TI-Writer manual). These and only these keys were the ones I decided to use for the printer First, though, it was commands. necessary to eliminate three of them that had already been assigned a function in TI-Writer, namesly SHIFT J,

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SHIFT L and SHIFT M, which were preassigned to function as the line feed, from feed and carriage return, respectively. This left 29 available characters, and I vowed I would assign every one of them, in some reasonably logical manner, to a printer command.

I had to cheat a little again in assigning the four FCTN keys to the foreign character sets I use most often. By using the native word for each of the languages (e.g., "deUtsch" for German) I was able to find a letter in each word that matched one of the four FCTN keys available "Z", "U", "R" and "T"). True, use of FCTN Z to initialiZe the standard USA character set is stretching the point a bit, but that was the only key left.

And remember too that all of these keystrokes must be preceded by pressing CTRL U to get into the special character (control character) mode in TI-Writer.

The greatest difficulty with the assignment of these particular keys to their respective printer commands is that the in-text symbols that TI-Writer prints on the screen for them have no particularly logical relationship to the commands they generate. In particular, except for the near-letter-Quality command, the in-text symbols for the "start" and "stop" commands for a given printer command are not directly related to one another. In Ron Castleton's system the relationship is more obvious. In setting up my system I chose to make the keystroke to enter the command the "easy thing to remember" rather than the in-text symbol that denotes the command. Table 2 lists in a logical order the intext symbols and the commands they denote. When proofing a document, one may simply refer to this Table to check the meaning of any symbol that is in question. (The symbols are listed in Table 1 as well). Of course, these symbols appear only in the screen display of the text, not in the printed copy.

determine the ASCII codes that must be sent to your printer to enter those commands. For example, I must send ASCII codes 27,45,49, in that order to begin continuous underlining on my Panasonic printer (see Table 1).

2. Place the appropriate code number(s) after the colon in the appropriate location in Table 1. For example, if your printer must receive ASCII code "7" to stop printing in elongated type, then place a "7" after the "4:" in the stop column on the elongated print line of Table 1, replacing the "27,87,48" that now follows the "4:". 3. Next, create a Transliteration File by entering the editor of TI-Writer and typing each transliteration given in Table 1 (as you may have amended it). Type each .TL command on a separate line that ends with a carriage return symbol.

Now you're ready to use what you've created. Every time you wish to print a document using any of the printer commands from the Transliteration File you've created, simply include the following line at the beginning of your document when creating it in the TI-Writer editor: .IF DSK1.TRANSCODES (or whatever name you've given to the file). Follow this with a carriage return. As you type the document, or later if you wish, enter the keystrokes listed in Table 1 as you need them. Remember to (1) press CTRL U to enter the special character mode, (2) press the SHIFT or FCTN key needed to implement the command you desire (e.g., SHIFT I for Italics), (3) press CTRL U again to exit the special character mode and (4) con-

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# Controversy slows sales for BITMAC program

Controversy over marketing rights to the BITMAC graphics program may have led to an overall loss of sales of that program.

The controversy has reportedly led to the refusal of Triton, a distributor for TI-related products, to carry BIT-MAC as marketed either by Vaughn Software of Arvada, Colorado, or by DataBioTics of California.

A point in controversy is that DataBioTics did not advertise the program in the Triton spring catalog. David Vaughn of Vaughn Software, the company which developed the program, says that Mike Evanbar of DataBioTics advised him that printed inserts advertising BITMAC had been prepared for the spring Triton catalog, but the product was not advertised. Bill Moseid, in charge of product development for DataBioTics, says that the inserts were delivered; however, "Triton has its own set of rules. They insist on a program sample. They have to be able to look at it and run it." He says that there was not a version of the program meeting DataBioTics' standards until it was too late for the Triton catalog. Vaughn says his marketing contract with DataBioTics is void because of a provision that the contract will be void if the publisher (DataBioTics) ceases through no fault of the developer (Vaughn Software) to make the program available to buyers for more than 30 consecutive days.

structions. He warns that only users who are capable of assembling kits that require soldering delicate integrated circuits should order SUPER SPACE in kit form.

Programs available for SUPER SPACE or SUPER CARTridge include Dohmann's SUPERBUG II, available (see the Freeware section) for \$3-5, which includes a version that will load into the >6000 memory space, and a disk of software from David R. Romer, 213 Earl St., Walbridge OH 43464 available for \$6. Dohmann notes that the instructions on how to set up a program with a GROM header from menu selection from a SUPER CARTridge will work the same with SUPER SPACE.

Dohmann says SUPERBUG II corrects deficiencies in the SUPERBUG program which TI released in 1984 as a public domain program. He says patches to the most serious deficiency, the fact that the dump or disassembly to disk did not work, have been published, but that his program corrects other deficiencies. His program fixes the dump and disassembly to disk problem similarly to the method by Tom Knight. DataBioTics officials say they want to sell their current inventory of the program and "get out." Moseid says the issue has been blown out of proportion.

DataBioTics officials note that selling the inventory has been difficult because of the controversy, and because Vaughn Software has been marketing BITMAC at \$29.95 and DataBioTics' price is \$39.95.

Vaughn says he had agreed to allow DataBiotics to sell off their inventory of BITMAC, but that this was before he knew that they had published software and manuals with a DataBiotics

"It is a very frustrating disease which strikes people in middle life, ages 40 to 60," Albright says.

He says that Foster, who is 44, has had the disease for "three or four years."

Alzheimer's disease, Albright says, "does not tend to spontaneously go away or spontaneously get better. People who have it tend to deteriorate. Nobody knows the cause. It may be some sort of slow virus."

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The clinical course of the disease, Albright says, is "totally variable. It can proceed sometimes slowly and sometimes rapidly."

Foster, Albright says, "used to be a design engineer. He assisted in designing buildings for oil refineries and was respected in that career. He's an interesting guy. His other great passion is model trains."

Foster says his great-grandfather was a foreman on the Santa Fe Railroad. Foster's model train collection is in "30 or 40 boxes" and includes "close to 300 locomotives and thousands of railroad cars." "One of the best examples of how Stephen has contributed," Albright says, "is, right after the great crash of October 1983 I got a bizarre letter out of the blue from a guy named Stephen Foster from Houston. What Stephen had done, Stephen had begun collecting music programs and had run across one in his trading that I had written the year before. The REM statement had my name and address."

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The letter, which Albright says was "bordering on a form letter, but obviously written by Stephen," was directed toward persons writing public domain music software.

am sure you could find hundreds of examples around the country and even in Canada."

Foster recalls that he had a form letter for persons interested in trading, and that Albright had programmed a Bach work. Foster says he got a hefty response of about one in 10 to his form letters.

"I've changed my phone number,"

"heart of gold."

Traver notes, "He is fundamentally a very honest person in trading. I'd like to give him more than he gives me but it never ends up that way. Stephen doesn't break even in his trading."

Albright says, "He is the sole reason I joined CompuServe. I never had heard of it. I owe him a great deal—most people do—for unifying us when we were a little down. "A deputy sheriff came out and looked at it and bought one," he notes. "Then, the Johnson Space Center User Group couldn't let the Houston User Group get out in front of them, so they started one. A couple of teen-aged kids have TI bulletin boards in Houston too."

he says. "I was getting 20 or 30 calls a day. I couldn't handle the telephone calls. I've gotten some from England, Australia and New Zealand wanting to know about different programs. So maybe that is a contribution. Mostly I encouraged guys to trade programs. There used to be so many guys who would write a program and act like 'This is my program and nobody's going to get it.'"

Barry Traver of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, describes Foster as having a Albright notes that Foster formerly spent from eight to 10 hours per day as sysop for HUGTIBBS. It should be mentioned that though DISK repair is the easiest disk fixing type program, you must take the time to study and understand the TI DOS. This can open avenues to your drive system of which you may not even be aware. Additional information on the TI DOS may be found in the Editor/Assembler manual.

From this money I purchased the TI color monitor so I won't tie up the family TV set anymore whenever I use my computer.

mation save the worksheet by pressing T(ransfer), S(ave) filename: refout (for **REFunds** OUTstanding.)

After saving this worksheet you are ready to address the envelopes. Close the window by pressing W(indow), C(lose), and Enter. Then increase the width of column 1 to 32 characters, this should be sufficient space for even the longest address line, put the envelope or self stick labels in the printer and select P(rint), O(ption), and use the arrow keys to position the cursor on the first line of the address to be printed, press the : (colon) and use the arrow keys again to position the cursor on the last line to be printed. The second line on the screen asks for the setup. Set it up. (In my case this is PIO, because I have a parallel printer.) Press ENTER. Then press M(argin) to set the margins: left 35, top 8, and press ENTER twice to start the printer. After receiving a refund you can print the information from columns one through six onto a sheet of paper and input it to a second worksheet.

And all it takes, is one Sunday per month. This is the time I reserve for my refunding activities. I go through my refund forms, which I have filed in envelopes by expiration month. I put the required qualifiers and the refund form in an envelope. Depending on the number of refunds, this takes one to two hours. After assembling all the refunds I plan on mailing, I use my computer and Microsoft Multiplan to address the envelopes, store the information, and keep track of the refund offers I have mailed, what I received in return, and what is still outstanding.

To collect all this data manually, I would have to have an index card for each of the offers, fill in the information and file it. This would take too much time. Thanks to my computer, one Sunday a month is all the time I need.

#### Procedures

After loading Multiplan turn off the automatic RECALC feature by pressing O, spacing to (NO), and pressing ENTER, to save time.

When you first set up the worksheets change the default settings as follows. Press F(ormat), D(efault), C(ells). The screen then shows: "FORMAT DEFAULT CELLS align:" press G(en), "code:" press F(ix), " of decimals:" press 2. Leave the width of the columns at eight characters. The first spread sheet is set up as follows: Col.1, width d, Name/Address of Offer Col.2, width d, Date mailed Col.3, width 12, Qualifiers mailed Col.4, width d, To get Coupon

Col.5, width d, To get Cash

Col.8, width d, Total Cash expected In Col.1 use as many lines as necessary for the complete address, since you will use this block to address the envelope.

In Col.2 use a four-digit julian date. In Col.3 list all the qualifiers you had to mail for that particular refund. In Cols.4 and 5 list the amount of the coupon/cash-refund you are expecting.

In Col.6 list the merchandise or free merchandise-coupon you should receive.

In Cols.7 and 8 use the SUM-Feature to total the amounts from Cols.4 and 5.

Here use only one line per refundoffer:

Col.1. Manufacturer Col.2. Name of Offer Col.3. P.O. Box No. Col.4. City Col.5. State Col.6. ZIP Code Col.7. Date mailed Col.8. To get Coupon Col.9. To get Cash Col.10. # DataBioTics announces advisory panel

DataBioTics of California has announced that it is setting up a national advisory panel as a "contact point between the factory and the user group."

According to Bill Moseid of DataBioTics, user groups have been offered the opportunity to have a representative on the panel who will sign a nondisclosure agreement. This will give the user groups an opportunity to have someone in their groups see a product and report on it to them. In addition, a user group can order two copies of each product at a 20 percent discount, one for the user group library and one for the representative.

Unfortunately, Software Specialties Inc. didn't hit the market with much of an impact and thus is in the process of liquidating its remaining cartridges of Midnite Mason, and that's a shame. For the most part, only users with a fully configured system will have an opportunity to play this outstanding game. But at \$10 this has to be one of the best bargains around in game software.

# Placing your files in RAM

#### **By WARREN AGEE**

Among the many Peripheral Expansion Box cards manufactured for the TI, one card stands out in the TI community as being truly unique, and that is Myarc's 32/128K card. Although Foundation's card has been available

ly the RAM disk. The most obvious use of this technique, for example, is to load all the TI-Writer files into the RAM disk for retrieval. This is done by first partitioning the RAM, giving it a volume name, then executing a CALL EMDK(2) to make the RAM disk accessible to Disk Manager. Now, with Disk Manager, copy the entire TI-Writer disk to drive 2, the RAM disk. Practically all of the time is spent reading the files off the disk and a fraction of a second is spent copying them to the RAM disk.

for quite some time, this one is surprisingly different.

**Performance:** The Myarc card comes in two different versions; one equipped just with 32K to replace your present 32K card. This can later be upgraded to the 128K version. The second version comes equipped with 128K, which consists of the standard 32K plus three additional banks of 32K each. The 128K version is also equipped with a RAM disk and a print spooler.

To utilize either the RAM disk or the print spooler, memory has to be partitioned first after every power-up. This can be done from either BASIC or XBASIC with the command CALL PART(x,y). A total of 96K is available. This must be divided up between the RAM disk and spooler with the above command. The values of x and and y must be whole numbers whose sum is 96. To reserve all 96K for the RAM disk, you type in CALL PART(96,0). Once the user partitions the memory for the RAM disk, he may also give this a "volume name." Don't be confused by this term; it is just another name for a diskname. Naming the **RAM** disk is done with the command CALL VOL("vol-name"). To obtain a directory of the RAM, use CALL RD-DIR. The directory literally zooms up the screen and appears in the same format as the Disk Manager directory. Now that the RAM is set up, the user may perform any disk processing tasks on the RAM disk as if it were a normal disk drive. This includes running programs (BASIC, XBASIC and assembly), as well as file I/O. The RAM disk may be addressed in one of two ways. The first is by using

## the prefix RD instead of DSK1 in the filename.

The second, and more powerful way, is to configure the RAM disk to emulate disk drive 1, 2, 3, 4 or 5. The command CALL EMDK(X) accomplishes this, where x represents the drive to emulate. Of course, emulating a drive you already have (like DSK1) effectively disables that disk drive since you cannot reconfigure disk drives, on-

(Another way to access TI-Writer for those with two drives is through the Utility function, after partitioning memory and entering EMDK(1). Simply load the TI-Writer program disk into DSK2 and enter DSK2.EDITA1 under the Utility function. The TI-Writer program will load and you will be able to read the RAM directory using the S(how) D(irectory) command of the TI-Writer editor. Not entering emulate disk (EMDK) prior to loading the program will stop you from accessing the RAM disk directory.—ED.) Once TI-Writer is in RAM, go back (Please turn to Page 38)

into BASIC and enter CALL EMDK(1). Now simply enter TI-Writer and hit "1" for Editor; in the bat of an eyelash, your editor loads and is ready to run.

Since I am an avid FORTH programmer, I was excited to think that all my FORTH routines and programs can now reside in RAM. All you FOR- Although Masscopy, by Stephen Lawless, has an option for accessing 128K, this will only work with Foundation's 128K card. No matter, for emulating DSK2 and copying to the RAM disk works beautifully with both of the above programs.

Unfortunately, another problem arises with Masscopy; it will not format the object disk at all. Even when the RAM disk is disabled, Masscopy refuses to do any formatting. So, by using the RAM disk with Nibbler, Masscopy, Disk Manager II, or DM1000, you have in effect a singlepass copier. Finally, the most disturbing incompatiblity occurs with TI-Artist. Even though Myarc states that this card is 100 percent compatible with all software, TI-Artist will not even boot in completely. **Documentation:** This is the only area in which Myarc's card rates poorly. Early versions of the manual contained gross inaccuracies. These were supposed to be remedied in an update of the manual, but I still had problems operating the print spooler at first.

The first error I found was in an attempt to correct the manual; a sticker was affixed to the page covering the print spooler which indicated that the command to start spooling through the PIO port is CALL PIO. This is wrong. No such command exists. Yet one would assume that this is a correction since the sticker is apparently covering up erroneous information. (A copy of the documentation received by MICROpendium in August shows the correction as CALL SPPIO-Ed.)

THers will be happy to hear that TI FORTH is totally compatible with the RAM disk. Since using Disk Manager to dump the FORTH screens into RAM is not always convenient, the following new word will do the trick. It is just a modified verison of FORTH-COPY:

: RD-COPY 90 0 DO I DUP . 90 + I SWAP SCOPY LOOP ;

Now you have a perfect copy of FORTH source screens residing in RAM for virtually instant retrieval.

The RAM disk has a number of other applications, including processing data base files and downloading files from bulletin boards. For example, using XMODEM transfers with FAST TERM on CompuServe's TI Forum, the RAM disk cuts down the access time by 1 second/record on the average. Obviously, the savings will be insignificant with small files, but the larger the file, the greater the savings. (The RAM disk is also compatible with Microsoft Multiplan. However, the SPPIO command for the print spooler did not appear to have any effect when on the Multiplan print routine.—ED.) There are several programs which I have found to be incompatible with the Myarc card in a variety of ways. The first group consists of most third-party copy utilities. These programs do work with the 128K card installed, but you

The print spooler feature of the Myarc 32/128K card is much easier to understand and utilize. Firstly, one must partition the RAM for use as a print spooler. CALL PART(0,96) reserves 96K of ram for the spooler. Now it is just a matter of naming your print devicename PS/2 or PS/2 (instead of RS232) or SPPIO (instead of PIO). With TI-Writer, a few seconds is spent dumping the text into the spooler, and control is returned back to you. You can now write another document, quit and play a game, or turn off the computer and leave! As long as power is supplied to the card, you can do anything you want! To abort the spooling, go into BASIC or XBASIC and execute CALL ABSP.

The second instance is not really an error, but it caused me confusion. Enclosed with the manual is a one-page addendum which pretty much corrects all the errors in the manual. However, there is no indication as to what information in the manual is in error, and what is not. What is one to believe—the sticker affixed to the manual or the addendum? The confusion mounted when I tried to use the print spooler with my CorComp RS232 card. I tried following the addendum with no luck. I tried following the sticker with no luck. As far as I was concerned, neither was correct! As I soon found out, I was the one out of luck!

At the time of this writing, Myarc is investigating two bugs apparently in the firmware of the 128K card. Firstly, the card will not recognize a CorComp Value: All in all, Myarc's 32/128K card is a fine piece of equipment that greatly enhances the performance of the TI-99/4A. Speed and convenience are its hallmarks. Even with the

obscure but serious bug with the null strings, I have used the RAM disk for everything from Forth programming to downloading XMODEM files with absolutely no trouble. Once Myarc corrects the problems above, I heartily recommend this piece of hardware to all users.

# GRAPHX Companion Clipboard for would-be artists

A common business practice in software development for other computers is to develop programs to "coat-tail" the successful software of their own or

productive with GRAPHX and have made the purchase of GRAPHX even more of a smart buy.

With the GRAPHX Companion disks (I say "disks" because the package comes on a flippy with both sides used), you get 10 different character fonts. Some of the more useful ones are the CFONT10, which is a very small character size (similar in size to the 64-column font used with TI-Forth, thus, a useful size to label inconspicuously, your designs. Another is an "inverse" font with white letters appearing against a block black background. The others are well-done and also useful for larger printing.

other companies in order to capitalize on a previously installed consumer base. Perhaps the classic examples are spelling checker programs to enhance the usefulness of a word processor program. Another example is the sale of preformed templates to increase spreadsheet productivity. The phenomenal success of PRINT SHOP (Broderbund), a graphics-print program, led the original manufacturer to follow it up with Graphics Library and Graphics Library II to expand the choice of designs to be used with that program. As the 99/4A community continues to mature and move to the mainstream of software production, the follow-on system of product development has begun to appear among our software developers. First, Dragonslayer's 99/4A Auto Spell-Check for TI-Writer and, now, **GRAPHX** Companion from ASGARD Software. Of all the recent bevy of graphics programs for the 99/4A, GRAPHX (GRAPHX, P.O. Box C568, Clarence St., Sydney, NSW Australia, 2000¢reviewed in the July, 1985 MICROpendium) stands out in the minds of many as the leader in this class of software. Perhaps the feature that sets this software above the others is the use of "clipboard" art. With this feature, one can design new character fonts, pieces of larger art to be used by the program much like a type-set for posters, letterheads, and even  $\cdot$  animated sequences. The GRAPHX system comes with a starter disk that includes four character fonts and two animated sequences, quite enough to get one started in producing print art and posters. But, unless you are moderately artistic, your graphics

All the above are useful and potentially productive features of GRAPHX Companion. However, the feature I like the best are the clipart sections. Of the 40 or so sketches (I didn't count, but that's a good guess) you will find some real beauties. There is clipart of the TI Peripheral Expansion Box and the 99/4A console that are, without a doubt, the very best sketches of this TI equipment I have ever seen. They can be dumped to a full-page printout and make great displays, newsletter covers, etc. Others that stand out in my mind are a large Canon AE-1 camera, a cassette tape, a "DOS" disk, a gorgeous antique car, stamp, tricycle, a set of clipart (11 in number) to create a pastoral scene (trees, fences, flowers), a set of textures to be used to shade your drawings, and a set of miscellaneous shapes as building blocks for your own drawings. I am, quite obviously, unable to describe in adequate detail how professionly these designs were done but they are impressive. They all print out on your printer beautifully and have myriad potential uses. Ease of Use: If you have GRAPHX, you will have no difficulty using these files. They are flawlessly loaded with GRAPHX and I encountered no problems whatever only having used GRAPHX a few times before. **Documentation:** The documentation is entirely adequate. The four pages of

## Scroll down

David Enterline, of New Waterford, Ohio, offers a scrolling routine that can be called from any Extended BASIC program. (Expansion memory is required.) A sample test program is included to demonstrate how to call the routine using CALL LINK (see line 230). The routine follows: Requirements are Multiplan and a program that allows single sector disk access. We'll do this in steps to minimize the confusion. It is recommended that the following be done using a newly initialized disk to make it easier.

Step 1: Get into Multiplan. Step 2: In Row 1, Column 1, using Alpha, enter ABC. Step 3: Press T for transfer. Press O for option, select Symbolic and press enter. ed files select No and press enter. The command should now appear in the worksheet at the cell location you entered. It is now ready to take control when the spreadsheet is sent to the printer.

There is no reason why you should stop with one printer control. You can enter a series of printer control commands and insert them wherever you like in your spreadsheet. You may do this by entering a series of single-cell references into a single file that would be called up based on cell location of the command or you may file them individually. Regardless of how you go, you now have the ability to take full control over your printer while using Multiplan, a very useful ability indeed.

Step 5: Leave Multiplan and load your single-sector disk access program. Assuming that you used a newly initialized disk, use the program's editor to go to sector 022.

Step 5: Depending on the capabilities of your sector access program, you may see the characters ABC or, if it doesn't display ASCII, you will see hex codes for ABC. The hex numbers representing ABC should appear as 41, 42 and 43. Replace these numbers with

## MP printer control

Have you ever wanted to gain control of your printer through Microsoft Multiplan? You know, send printer controls using spreadsheets created with Multiplan? Well, according to Curtis Ringold of the Mid-South Users Group, it is possible, though it takes a little time. The following information is a condensed version by Walt Maes of Ringold's solution, which appeared in The Suncoast Beeper, the newsletter of the Suncoast 99ers. the following: 0F, 1B, 47.

Step 6: Save these changes to disk. Step 7: Reenter Multiplan. Press T, then select Symbolic and enter. Press T, then load the file you saved. Examine R1C1. Instead of ABC, you should see a control character and the letter G.

Step 8: Press T, then Option and move the cursor to Normal. Press enter.

Step 9: Resave this file under a new name. This cell may now be called up and placed anyplace in a spreadsheet to send a control to the printer, in this case a Gemini. The control here created is for condensed, doublestrike.

Step 10: To insert this printer control into a spreadsheet, type X for External and C for Copy. Enter the name of the second file you created containing the control character. Press Control A. Type in R1C1. Press CTRL A. Type in the cell location you want the control character to appear in the spreadsheet. Press CTRL A. ## More than 80

Todd Staszak, president of the 99/4A Users of Canada, P.O. Box 1252, Lambeth, Ontario, NOL 1SO, Canada writes: "In the June 1985 issue of your magazine, there was a letter from a person who wanted program listings in condensed print on their Gemini printer. The problem, however, is that the TI RS232 cuts the lines off at 80 characters."

"The only solution I can think of is to first list the program to a disk, with LIST "DSK1.filename" and then run a program, such as the one included (see below). My printer, in compressed print, prints 142 characters per line, so you may have to change the length in line 190. You may also have to change (Please turn to Page 43)

## Running text

This program comes from the Mid-Atlantic Ninety Nine'ERs (MAN-NERS). According to Maurice Swinnen, the program was picked up from a European computer club. This program was written by a Dutch programmer, Swinnen wrote in the MANNERS Newsletter.

The program generates large character sprites as a banner, with the words formed in lines 120 and 130. The number of repetitions in the FOR-NEXT loops must equal the number of characters in each word, spaces included. Line 140 changes the colors of the sprites. Below these large letters, starting at line 200, a message is created that crawls across the bottom of the screen. Lines 200-220 are used to concatenate message into a lengthy chain. There is no limit as to how many message lines may be strung together. Line 300 · creates the crawl effect. The CALL SOUND is incidental and may be dispensed with if desired. Here is the program:

Homebrew Module Software includes four stand-alone programs as well as a loader system to provide title screen menu access to "Load and Run" E/A programs. The programs—Single Sector Copy, Debug, Disassembler and TK-Writer loader—are load into the 8K module RAM and are accessed from the title screen menu. They need not be reloaded because the module is battery backed. Source programs and documentation are included.

TI-SORT is a machine language utility that loads under the TI-Writer and TK-Writer utility option or Option 5 of E/A. Data files created with the TI-Writer or E/A editor can be sorted rapidly in RAM with this utility. The program uses standard TI menu format and sorts DIS/VAR 80 files. Files of up to 300 records may be sorted, using either the quicksort or shellsort algorithm and saved to disk. Files may also be printed. Single or bi-level ascending sorts are supported. Documentation and a demonstration file are included.

Amnion Helpline is offering TL users its Free Access Library of public domain software. The library consists of 104 diskettes filled with programs for the TI99/4A.

The library is operated as a non-profit entity by Dr. Guy-Stefan Romano, director of Amnion Helpline. The helpline is a free information service for TI users who have questions about products and other aspects of home computing.

The library provides "volumes" of programs.
